Wing Tanks Support

Several hours after the accident a portion of the plane still was showing above water, apparently held up by wing tanks. The plane, chartered by the Military Air Transport Service and operated by a Northwest Airlines crew, was Northwest's flight 324 from Tokyo, via Shemya in the Aleutian Islands, and Anchorage, Alaska.

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Tunisia Reports Riot Outbreak

PARIS (AP)—The Tunisian delegation at the United Nations said Saturday it had received word of a new outbreak of rioting in Tunisia, in which seven persons were killed and 25 wounded. Earlier, French newspaper reports that passed through French censorship indicated new trouble in the French North African protectorate where anti-French Nationalists have been demonstrating for an independent republic. The Tunisian delegates, who have been in daily contact with Tunisia since violence flared three days ago, said the latest incident was at Mateur, southwest of the big Mediterranean port of Bizerte. They said police and French troops attacked Nationalists.

Three States Consider Truck Reciprocity Plan

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—Officials from Oregon, Idaho and Washington will meet in Portland Thursday to establish truck reciprocity in the three states. That means trucks from each of the states will be permitted to operate on each others' highways without special licenses. Reciprocity with Idaho was to end Jan. 1 because that state's legislature failed to renew its reciprocity agreements. The legislature at a special session this week gave Gov. Len Jordan authority to enter into reciprocity agreements. Reciprocity has been extended by temporary agreement since Jan. 1.

Oregon Railroads Given Freight Rate Increase

SALEM (AP)—Oregon railroads, operating within the state, can raise their freight rates 6 per cent. The increase was granted Friday by Charles H. Helzel, public utilities commissioner. He said the increase was similar to one granted by the Interstate Commerce Commission last August which permitted railroads west of the Mississippi River to up their rates 6 per cent.

He came to Roseburg in 1928, settling in the Melrose community and engaging in farming until recently, when he moved into town and took employment as a watchman at Young's Bay Lumber Co. Enemy Destroys 10 Allied Planes

By SAM SUMMERLIN SEOUL, Korea (AP)—Communist jets and groundfire blasted 10 Allied warplanes out of North Korean skies in the past seven days, the U. S. Fifth Air Force announced Saturday. The announcement came as F-86 Sabre jets bagged one Communist MIG-15 and damaged another in a brief duel over Northwest Korea. The battle pitted 18 Sabres against elements of a 50-plane Communist jet formation. Snow flurries fell along the quiet 145-mile battlefield and heavy clouds hampered Allied air strikes. U.N. pilots pounded Red rail in 160 sorties flown by noon. The weekly Fifth Air Force summary said two Sabre jets were lost between Jan. 12 and 18 in aerial battles with the MIGs. Eight other planes were shot down by Red ground fire Communist losses for the same period were three destroyed and seven damaged in air battles.

Aluminum Union Threatens Strike

PITTSBURGH (AP)—A nationwide strike of some 35,000 aluminum workers early in February darkened the industrial scene Saturday as management-CIO-AFL contract talks remained stalemate. A spokesman for Aluminum Company of America, biggest producer in the industry, said the AFL Aluminum Workers Union has broken off contract negotiations and threatens to strike Feb. 3 unless agreement is reached by then. About 9,500 workers at six plants are involved. James G. Thimmes, vice president of the CIO United Steelworkers, said 11,000 members of his union have no other recourse but to strike Feb. 1 if a new contract is not signed with Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical Co. The CIO-USW issued an ultimatum to ALCOA on Wednesday that 15,000 workers will strike Feb. 1 unless a contract is negotiated. Thimmes said the USW is making the same demands on Kaiser as on most of the steel industry. Those demands include wage boosts totaling about 18 1/2 cents an hour and improved vacation, holiday and incentive pay benefits.

Air Force Loses 457 Warplanes

TOKYO (AP)—The U.S. Air Forces Saturday said the United Nations have lost at least 457 warplanes since the start of the Korean war. It was the largest total of Allied losses yet announced.

It did not include Navy losses, non-U.S. losses before July 1, 1951, Marine losses before July 1, 1951, or light Army planes lost. The Air Forces said 37 Allied jets and 15 propeller type planes were shot down in aerial combat. There were 339 Red planes destroyed, it said, most of them in air battles. Of these, it said, 204 were Russian-designed MIG 15 jet fighters.

The Air Force also claimed 100 "probable" kills, 51 of them MIGs, and 387 Red planes damaged. All told the Air Force and its attached units hit a total of 826 planes in the 19 months of war. Figures from the Navy's powerful carrier-based fleet of planes would swell that total considerably. The Air Force listed 133 jets and 220 propeller type planes lost to Communist ground fire. Most of the latter type were F-51 Mustangs and B-26 and B-29 bombers.

HERMISTON, Ore. (AP)—A baby and a McNary Dam worker were killed in a head-on crash between two automobiles two miles north of here on McNary Road Friday night. They were Alfred Patrick Ford, 32, of Portland, and Linda B. Walters, 5 months old. The baby's parents, Edward and Thelma Walters, were taken to St. Anthony's Hospital, Pendleton, for treatment of injuries. They were reported in fair condition. They live at Silver City, a trailer camp at McNary Dam.

Ex-Ball Player, Hero Medal Holder, Dies

THE DALLES, Ore. (AP)—A one-time professional baseball player, who also held a Carnegie heroism award, died Thursday. He was W. A. Salisbury, 75, resident of Rowena, west of here. In 1901 he pitched for Portland in the Pacific Northwestern League and the next year he was taken by the Philadelphia Phillies, but was released in mid-season. In 1911 he saved Archie O. Ramsden, a telegrapher, from drowning in the Willamette River at Albany and received a Carnegie Hero Commission bronze medal and \$1,000.
