Oregon Indians Capable Of Self-Rule, Assertion

PORTLAND (AP) — Western Oregon Indians' desire to be freed of government supervision got a big boost Wednesday. The area Director of Indian Affairs gave his blessing to the plan.

Director E. Morgan Pryse said the more than 2000 Indians were fully capable of managing their own affairs.

Pryse said the Indians affected have talked over the plan at numerous meetings, and approved the move.

Not all Indians in the Pacific Northwest, however, are willing to take the same step. A delegation from the Yakimas was scheduled to meet with Pryse Thursday to protest any such proposal. They want the government to keep on as trustee of their property.

Congress Action Needed

The Western Oregon Indians also will have to wait a while before the can be cut loose from supervision. First, Congress will have to appropriate funds for a census of Western Oregon Indians, who have scattered, some living in

towns and some working as loggers and fishermen.

The Indians own two reservations, one at Grand Ronde, another at Siletz. The Siletz Indians want their reservation, mostly timberland, sold. The money would be divided among tribe members. The Grand Ronde reservation would be deeded to the tribe, to do with as members wish.

Four of the 43 tribes and groups have \$3,128,900 coming to them from the government. The U.S. Supreme Court ruled last year that they are entitled to that sum for lands taken by white settlers in the last century. Congress still has to appropriate the money for that.



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New British Diplomat To Tackle Iran Dispute

LONDON (AP)—Britain has named Robert Hankey, a young but tried diplomat as her new ambassador to Tehran in the hope of ending the long Anglo-Iranian oil deadlock, informed officials said Monday.

The 46-year old Hankey, who speaks Persian, will succeed the present envoy, Sir Francis Shepherd, whose tenure in Tehran has extended throughout the crisis resulting from nationalization of the British-owned Anglo-Iranian Oil Company's vast holdings there.

MIRACULOUS HEALING Is Not For Today.

ARTICLE NO. 1

For the past few weeks the local Assembly of God church has been conducting a series of nightly meetings with Mr. Wilbur Henry serving as evangelist. Recently there appeared an ad by the writer, challenging Mr. Henry's claim that miracles are performed today. I am sure that many feel this action was improper, while others think it was the thing to do. Regardless of how one may feel about the matter, I not only have the right to question a man's teaching if I doubt its truthfulness, but I am enjoined by the Scriptures to do so. Since the claim made was publicly, the challenge should also have been made publicly.

Christ and the apostles warned that many false teachers would arise and lead many astray (Mt. 7:15; 15:9; 24:11; 1 Tim. 1:7; 4:1, 2; 2 Tim. 4:3, 4). We are commanded to try them. "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try (Test—J.C.C.) the spirit whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world." (1 John 4:1). We have an example of the church in Ephesus trying some who said they were apostles and "found them to be liars" (Rev. 2:2). I believe that a man should welcome an unbiased investigation of his claim as it would be strengthened if found to be true. I have no claim against the man, this being my first time to meet him. However, I do not believe what he teaches about the miraculous operation of the Holy Spirit.

Now that Mr. Henry has left the community, we do not intend to pursue him further. However, we think it only fair to let the public know why we believe that the age of miracles is past. For those who have inquired and for you who may wish to know but have not inquired, we state our reasons. It is our present plan to make this a short series of daily articles to set forth briefly the main points of the proposition. If you wish further information or if you have questions that are not answered in this series, please feel free to write us. These articles will be numbered, and we encourage you to clip them for further use.

In the remaining portion of this article I wish to clarify the issue. First, I want to say that all healing is divine—from God, but not all healing is miraculous. Healing by natural means is divine. Doctors had discovered the means and medicines, sometimes by chance, to be used in overcoming disease and afflictions. Miraculous healing is beyond the natural, contrary to law, supernatural. This we deny is taking place today.

Let me say, further, that it is not a question of the power of God. God is able to perform a miracle. He has done so, but is He performing them today? That is the point of issue. At one time He formed man from the dust of the ground. He could do it now, but is He? No. I believe He could make oranges grow on mulberry trees, but He isn't doing it. Neither is He healing miraculously today.

It is not a question of faith in prayer. I pray for the sick, and I believe that God does heal by natural means, if it is His will to do so. Suppose I pray for God to make a man out of dust today. You would say, "You should not do that." Why haven't I as much right to pray for this miracle as to pray for a miracle of healing when both have served their purpose and have come to an end. The whole question, therefore, is: does God perform miracles today? Just because He once performed them is no reason He does now. Our reasons for believing He does not will be found in subsequent articles.
