

Blackmail Seen In Soviet Plan

PARIS (AP) — The United States accused Russia Tuesday of using "blackmail" to try to force the entry of her satellites into the United Nations.

American Delegate Ernest A. Gross told the 60-nation Political Committee that the U.S. would refuse to pay.

He defined the blackmail as Russia's demand that the West support Albania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Romania and Outer Mongolia for membership in the U.N. in exchange for a Soviet promise not to veto the applications of Italy, Libya, Ireland, Finland, Portugal, Jordan, Austria, Ceylon and Nepal.

If the West paid off, Gross charged, Russia would keep inventing "shadowy, synthetic so-called states" like Outer Mongolia and demand their entrance every time any other state applied.

"Blackmail is always sought in installments," Gross declared.

Earlier Britain's Sir Gladwyn Jebb had also turned down the Russian offer.

The U.S. and British refusals to accept the Russian offer appears to rule out any hope for early admission of new U.N. members.

Lane County Robbers Get 10-Year Terms

War Manufacturing Keeps Production Figures Soaring

NEW YORK (AP) — Defense manufacturing kept production figures high last week. The important textile industry, however, was in a bad way.

There appeared little doubt that defense orders were the basis of the high production.

An increasing number of businessmen inclined to the view that if it wasn't for defense work the economy would be in an unenviable condition.

During the week the nation's steel mills upped their output. Freight carloadings were above the previous week. More electric power was generated and more coal was mined.

Crude oil production was the lowest since June — 6,063,850 barrels.

President Truman in his economic message to Congress saw the year ahead as a "year of strain."

He forecast the "most difficult" year of the armament build-up and large federal deficits.

He asked for a 1952 tax increase amounting to around five billion dollars by increases in some rates and by plugging loopholes. He temporarily abandoned his pay-as-you-go mobilization. Although he said it should be picked up again as quickly as possible.

Spells Production

The entire message spelled continued high production and high employment. Whether the proposed added tax burden would fall on business, income or excise rates were not specified.

Businessmen watched for the President's budget message for a further answer next Monday.

Dun and Bradstreet reported retail trade continued at the high level of the previous week.

On prices, the Dun and Bradstreet wholesale food price index declined to the lowest average level since Nov. 7, 1950.

And a top price control official said the government may write a new restaurant order gearing meal prices to wholesale food costs.

The reaction to conditions on the New York stock exchange was one of a rise in the averages and advancing prices. As the week closed the averages were hovering near a 21-year peak.

Oregon Resignations In Civil Service Shown

SALEM (AP) — The turnover of state civil service employees last year averaged 4 1/2 per cent a month, State Civil Service Director James Clinton said Monday.

Clinton said that figure is about average for private employment throughout the country.

There was an average of 10,330 civil service employees working for the state last year. During the year there were 4,502 resignations and 293 dismissals.

Many positions remained vacant because of a shortage of nurses, doctors, engineers, and others in technical and professional classes.

Pro-Nationalist Tunisians Fight French Forces

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) — Rioting broke out anew Tuesday in this French North African Protectorate. Nine Tunisians and a French officer were killed at Sousse, a city of 25,000 southeast of here.

This brought the death toll to 28 in a week of fighting between independence seeking Nationalists and French police.

Colonel Durand, French military commander of the Sousse Region, fell in Tuesday's clash. Rioting still flared at Sousse in mid-afternoon.

At least five Tunisians were killed and 20 wounded Monday night by grenades hurled during a demonstration at Nabeul, also southeast of Tunis. A French gendarme died in a shooting near the port of Bizerte.

Tunisian Nationalists who have appealed to the United Nations to intervene released in Paris a letter from the Bey of Tunis to French Airp. u. n. A. rifliot inroer etaoiet eta ter from the Bey of Tunis to French President Vincent Auriol in April, 1950, in which the Bey pleaded for reforms giving Tunisia more political freedom.

The letter warned that if the Tunisian people were not given some satisfaction they might be swept by "a hopelessness that could provoke just what we want to avoid."

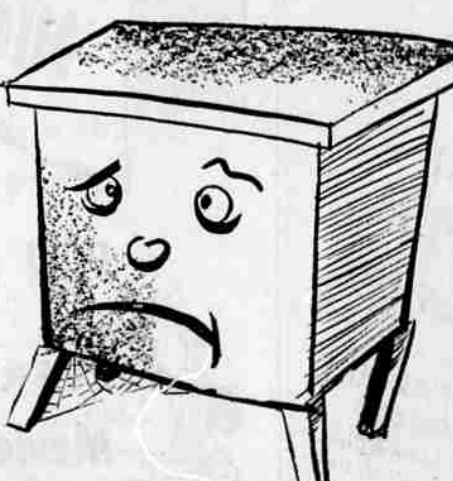
