Trotters Meet Locals Tonight In High School

When the Harlem Globetrotters make their 1952 invasion of Roseburg tonight at 8, they will have probably the most powerful hoop quintet to ever perform in the Northwest.

This was assured Tuesday with the addition of all-time Trotter great, Duke Cumberland and Ducky Moore to the previous power-laden Negro outfit. With these important inserts on the squad, the magnificent court magicians are expected to put on an incomparable show against the J C sporting goods quintet at the Roseburg High School gym.

Beside Cumberland and Moore, the Trotters will bring Captain Babe Pressley, Carl Helom, Leon Hillard, Tom Sealy, Ewell Perry, Pop Gates, and Frank Washington. Expect More Changes.

Promoter Abe Saperstein emphasized Tuesday that the additions of Cumberland and Moore had been made within the last week and possibly more changes would be added.

Traveling with the club this year is Ray Wilbert, world-famous hoop artist. These differ from the term "basketball hoop" in that Wilbert's hoops are movable and some fancy moving he does with them. He manipulates a set of the rings into some of the most fantastic possible feats. His artistry with the magic rings has won him acclaim in theaters, night clubs, arenas and music halls all over the world. In recent years he has become a sure-fire television hit.

After Wilbert performs at halftime, the fundamental basketball slacks off for the Trotters to perform their famous basketball antics.

Roseburg Wrestling Squad Deadlocks Cavemen Team

Roseburg High School's rapidly improving wrestling squad amazed a gleeful throng of Roseburg fans at the local high school gym Tuesday night by battling highly-touted Grants Pass to a 24-24 deadlock.

The well-attended team match drew the plaudits of about 200 fans who paid to watch the usually untended contests. Most of the through agreed LeRoy Wehde in the heavyweight division was the Indian hero. He didn't win, but his holding action had the spectators screaming. Vic Barker, the Grants Pass heavyweight caught Wehde in a pinning hold and tried for a full minute to clinch the match and the meet, but Wehde always managed to keep one shoulder up and assure the final tie.

This was the closest a Roseburg team has ever come to upsetting a Grants Pass team. Even more impressive, this is the same Grants Pass team which lost to state champion Klamath Falls earlier in the year by a mere five points.

The Vikings were all but dismissed from contention for sub-district basketball leadership Tuesday night when LeRoy Elting and his tribe of Roseburg Indians whooped to a 49-38 district win at Myrtle Creek.

Forward Elting made his best showing of the year by racking up 24 points, 18 in the first half, spelled Viking district loss No. 2. First, Roseburg Feigh kept the boards clean as a whistle, and second, Myrtle Creek hit a bleak period in the third quarter, in which the Vikings scored only two field goals. While Roseburg was hitting 383 in the second half, Myrtle Creek succeeded on only .172 percent.

The Vikings held one-point leads early in the first quarter and mid-way in the second and tied the game three times in the opening half before finally succumbing. John Cameron, playing one of his top games of the year, gave his Viks a 1-0 start with a foul shot. Roseburg countered with baskets by Jim Gilbert and Elting, but Myrtle Creek pulled ahead, 4-2, when Bob Wilder hit two buckets.

The score was tied at 6, 19 and 21 before the Vikings took their 21 lead, 22-21, on a free throw by Don Gillespie. From this point the Indians gradually pulled away. By halftime they were on top, 29-24.

The Viks completely bogged down in the third quarter. Gillespie and Roseburg's Ralph Hudzik countered baskets to run the score to 33-28, and the Myrtle Creek death started. When Neil Tester finally broke the ice for the Vikings again, it was early in the fourth quarter and Roseburg was coasting away, 46-30. Things didn't improve much and soon the Indians had their biggest bulge of the game at 49-31. The die was cast.

Elting's fireball faking and shooting antics drew the plaudits of Myrtle Creek Coach Bob Abrahamson. "That kid's great," Abrahamson mused.

DEFENSE ORDERED

Harry Matthews May Get Shot At Jersey Joe's Title

NEW YORK — The pincers that have been tightening on Heavyweight Champion Jersey Joe Walcott for the past twenty-four hours Wednesday had the ancient New Jersey battler ready to give up his lucrative exhibition tour and sign for a defense of his title.

But Jersey Joe, who probably will climb in the ring against Edward Charles whose crown he lifted last July 18, had one ally—Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, which has a contract with the champion.

When Norris heard that Bob Chatterberry, the new chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, had ordered Walcott to defend his title within 15 days or have it vacated in New York, the IBC president said:

"I had thought it was understood that Walcott was to be given the chance to make the most of the financial opportunities he has as champion before being required to defend."

Rumors have been making the rounds that Felix Bocchicchio, Walcott's manager, would prefer Marciano to Charles. However, Marciano said he doesn't want to fight for the title unless Charles waives his right.

Norris couldn't contact Bocchicchio, but Jersey Joe's manager issued a statement saying:

"We may decide to sign for three bouts within 15 days, probably a first bout with Matthews on the West Coast and a title defense in June. We have a verbal agreement, made under duress, to defend against Charles. We will take one tuneup fight, preferably against Matthews, and I look with favor on signing for a title bout with either Marciano or Charles."

(Every time a heavyweight champion steps in the ring, he risks his title. Bocchicchio did not explain how he proposed to get around this.)
