In the bitterly fought first half, the score was tied seven times and changed hands five. The Oakridge crew only stayed in the game with its spectacular foul shooting. The visiting Warriors connected on 14 of 18 free throws in the first half. From the floor they added only two baskets.

The malady was contagious because Drain had its jitters troubles also. The hosts led 7-5, in the first quarter, but dropped behind 18-17 at halftime. The Drain trouble continued, however, after Oakridge caught fire in the third quarter. Loss of boardmen George Kelly and Mary Swearingen on fouls in that canto further dimmed the Drain hopes and the visitors went ahead, 45-36 in the fourth quarter. Allie Clark of Oakridge scored 13 points for the winners.

Mine Safety Devices Advised By Truman

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman asked congress Tuesday for legislation to prevent a recurrence of "shocking fatalities" in the coal mines such as the recent disaster at West Frankfort, Ill.

Bills are pending to grant enforcement powers to the Interior Department to assure compliance with federal standards of mine safety, and Mr. Truman urged quick action on them.

The President directed his appeal in letters to Vice President Barkley and Speaker Rayburn after receiving a report on the West Frankfort disaster, which claimed the lives of 119 miners last Dec. 21.
