

WINSTON COMMUNITY CLUB PLANS SKATING CLUB FOR MEMBERS

Plans are being made to organize a Skating Club for the residents of the Winston-Dillard area as an added service of the Winston Community Club. Forest Dean Collins of Dillard was chosen Committee Chairman to work out the plans with the aid of A. N. Johnson, Elmer Hunter, Carl Borgeson, and Arthur McGuire, and any others who are interested in helping promote the project.

To date, there have been two meetings of the Committee at the home of Arthur McGuire. The first necessary step in planning the Skating Club is to re-floor the Club House with a hardwood floor which will stand up under the wear and tear of the skates. Mr. Elmer Hunter reported on this part as to costs and other estimates. On these estimates, the committee decided to raise \$2,000 for the project through solicitations. Mr. Arthur McGuire is in charge of solicitations through the school children and Mrs. A. N. Johnson through the business men.

The plan of organization for the Skating Club is to make it a subsidiary of the Winston Community Club to be known as the Winston-Dillard Skating Division of the Winston Community Club. Each member will be charged annual dues according to status of grade school, high school or adult. The club will acquire skates and resell them on a non-profit basis to the members in such a way that a paid each time the individual skates will be applied to the cost of the skates. Figures on these will be available later.

Others of the two communities serving with the committee are: Rev. Frank B. Drew of Dillard as publicity agent, Fred Alburton in charge of printing, Jack Darling, Ernest Jorgenson, Jr. Jack Hill. Others will be added from time to time as interest and need arise.

WACU, Tex., (AP) — Baylor's errant "clasped hands" of Robert and Elizabeth Browning were back home Thursday.

Dr. A. Joseph Armstrong, Baylor's world famous authority on the 19th century english poets, was asleep when the bronze statue was taken to his home at 8:45 p.m. Wednesday.

The discovery was made by Vice President W. I. Gooch of Baylor who found the bronze casting on the front seat of his auto.

The relic was returned after Dr. W. B. White, Baylor President, made a public promise of "no questions asked" if the hands were recovered.

The art object was taken from its glass case in the foyer of the \$3 million Armstrong-Browning library sometime Monday night.

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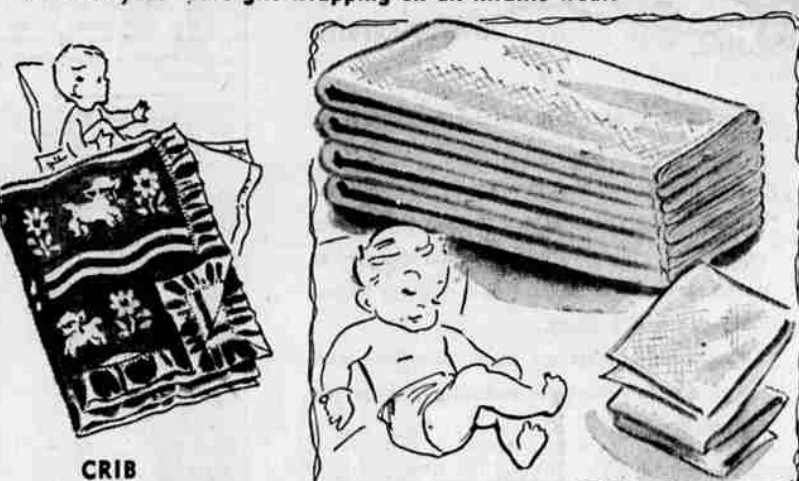
