Employers Warned On Salary Reporting

"Don't stop too soon, but don't go too far," says Claude E. Dawson, manager of the Eugene social security office.

Dawson's plea is directed to the bookkeeper who fills out quarterly social security wage reports. Top amounts for one employee in a year used to be \$3,000. Under the new law, the ceiling is \$3,600.

"Some firms still seem to be reporting no more than \$3,000 even when the worker is making more than that," says Dawson. "That's bad — a correction must be made, or the worker doesn't get full social security wage credit."

"Other firms report more than \$3,600 in a year for one employee," stated Dawson. In these cases, as he pointed out, the firm, and perhaps the worker too, have paid more than the required social security tax, but the worker can get old-age and survivors insurance wage credit only for \$3,600 in a year.

Lumber Firm Files Appeal From Judgment

Notice of appeal to the state Supreme Court was filed in Circuit Court Wednesday by C. G. and H. Lumber Company, defendant in an action for money.

The appeal was made from a court judgment of last Nov. 28 in which Paul C. Gross, plaintiff, was awarded \$1,725 allegedly due on a contract for purchase of a truck and crane.

A jury had returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff awarding him that amount. Attorney's fees of \$300 were also granted.

Barcus Sales and Service filed a complaint Wednesday in Circuit Court against V. W. Gunby for foreclosure of mortgage offered as security on a promissory note.

Stubborn Battles Rage On Korean Front

lied ground troops on the eastern end of the battle line.

North Korean communists said Communist guns Tuesday sank one Allied "war craft" off Korea's east coast and shot down three U.N. planes near Wonsan Wednesday. There was no confirmation from U.N. sources.

MUNSAN, Korea — The United Nations Command Thursday accused the Communists of "playing the waiting game" in the Korean truce talks, hoping the Allies will "capitulate out of sheer exasperation."

An official U.N. broadcast beamed to Korea from Tokyo said: "Either the Reds have no intention of reaching an armistice and are merely killing time until their next offensive, or they have been instructed not to bargain on any point . . ."

"The latter alternative may be the truer one at this date," the broadcast said. The Reds' "waiting game" is "an overt admission from Communist leaders that right now they do not expect anything to happen."

As negotiators haggled fruitlessly over Korean truce terms Thursday, a U.N. delegate accused the Communists of planning to use sick and wounded prisoners as a lever to force Allied acceptance of Red armistice terms.

is largely due to one large operator, now cutting 30 million feet per year, who expects to finish cutting by that time.

Other roads which the study cites as having an expected 100 million or more board feet of timber moving over them during each three-year period are:

Sutherland-Umpqua Road, Little River Road, Canyonville-Riddle Road, Riddle-Glenbrook Loop and Tiller-South Umpqua Road.

Will Guide Policies
The Upper Smith River Road is expected to have that volume during only three periods, the Rock Creek Road during two periods, and the Cavitt Creek Road during one period, according to the study.

The survey was made by the Forest Appraisal Department at the request of the County Court for use in determining future road policies, Kleiner said. Work was begun last spring and the final report is expected to be finished late next week.

In all, 205 roads in the county are included in the project. In preparing the study, the department contacted the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management and large timber operators in the county and asked how much timber they expected to move over certain road during each three-year period. Estimates were made by the department to cover the multitude of small operators, Kleiner said.

The lowest spot in the United States is Inyo, Calif. It is 280 feet below sea level.

Since that spectacular start, his reputation has spread throughout both Americas, Australia and Europe. He has been highly acclaimed for his role as the Zulu minister, who leaves his humble flock to search for his son who has gone astray, in the musical "Lost in the Stars."
