MIRACULOUS HEALING IS NOT FOR TODAY!

ARTICLE NO. 3

In Article No. 2 we showed that the purpose of miracles was to demonstrate that the preacher was authorized of God, to confirm the word. We shall continue by proving that men do not have miraculous power today because the means by which it came is no longer operative.

One of the two ways in which miraculous power was bestowed upon men in New Testament times was the baptism of the Holy Spirit. There are only two examples of this measure. The first was on the Jews on Pentecost, Acts 2:1-4. The purpose was to fulfill God's prophecy in Joel 2:28 that all flesh would receive the Spirit. This does not mean all human flesh, for all admit that, not every individual receives it. All flesh was Jew and Gentile. There is no other flesh. The Holy Spirit came upon the apostles in particular to guide them into all truth and to confirm their message.

The second example was upon the Gentiles about ten years later, Acts 10:44. It came to complete the promise that all flesh would receive the Spirit and to convince the Jews that God had accepted the Gentiles into His grace. This measure did not come through human agency but as a promise directly from heaven, coming only in these two instances. The Bible nowhere teaches that we are to receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit today.

I shall show that it was restricted to the apostolic age. In the first part of Acts, you will find where two baptisms, one of the Spirit (Acts 2:4; 10:44) and the other of water (Acts 2:38; 10:47). There were two elements involved, one being distinct from the other, hence two baptisms. This was about A. D. 41. In A. D. 64 Paul said, "There is—no baptism." Eph. 4:4, 5. Peter, writing about this time, said it was water baptism, 1 Pet. 3:21. Since there were two baptisms, but later there was only one, which was water, we see that the Holy Spirit baptism ceased. Since it ceased, the miracles that went with it also ceased.

The other means of receiving the power to perform miracles was through the laying on of the apostles' hands. Philip could preach and do signs because the apostles had laid their hands on him, but he could not pass the gifts to others. The apostles had to come from Jerusalem to give Philip's converts the power to do signs. See Acts 8:1-7. But, the apostles are all dead now, and the means of getting this power is no longer present.

We have seen that miraculous gifts were given in two ways — by the baptism of the Holy Spirit and the laying on of the apostles' hands. Neither the Holy Spirit baptism nor the apostles are with us today; therefore, the means of obtaining miraculous powers have ceased, and they are no longer present.
