

Indians Meet Pelican Squad Crippled By Flu

Roseburg Indian chances of re-venezing last year's double debacle at the hands of sixth-rated Klamath Falls this weekend took on a rosier hue Thursday when it was reported the Pelicans would not have Ralph Carroll.

Carroll is the six-foot seven inch pivotman who has been doing a large share of Pelican scoring in the first 11 games this season. According to Pelican Coach Paul McCall, Carroll will be sidelined for the Roseburg series because of a case of the flu which has been plaguing him for over a week.

This gives the Indians a better chance on the boards, an aspect which has been generally in their favor this season. But the Indians still have to cope with Radar Ray Bell, a high-scoring forward who has been giving Carroll a battle for the team point-making leadership.

Another bright spot which can't be overlooked from the Indian side of the fence is the faltering ways the Pelicans have shown in recent games. After running up a fine pre-season record of six wins, one loss and one tie (caused by a scorekeeping mistake), the Pelicans ran into snags at both Medford and Grants Pass in District 4 play. Before the district competition started, the Pelicans were entrenched in first place on the Associated Press high school basketball poll.

Then, Medford turned white hot to dump them in the second district game. Grants Pass followed it with the Pelicans' second district loss on the following weekend.

After the Medford loss, Klamath Falls fell to fourth place in the poll, and the Grants Pass loss dropped them to sixth.

At any rate, Klamath will go into the series tonight with a record of 8-1-1. Roseburg's record is 7-7.

Two Glide Hoopsters In AAU Scoring Race

A report from Glide calls attention to an oversight in tabulating individual scores for the top ten pointmakers in the Umpqua Valley AAU Basketball League.

The tabulation, printed in the News-Review Tuesday, Jan. 22, omits Glide's heaviest scorer, Jack Harvey. A quick glance through the records reveals he has scored 79 points in six games to place him in a tie with Don Hubbard of J.C. Sporting Goods for fourth place. His average is 13.1 points per game.

Another slip tagged Glide's seventh spot placement as Bill Evans. Actually, his name is Byron Evans, the Glide school superintendent.
