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Soviets Expected To Field Teams In Olympic Meet

LONDON (AP) — Soviet Russia probably will field teams in about half of the events at the summer Olympic games at Helsinki, Finland, in July.

An Associated Press survey Friday showed the Russians currently are eligible to take part in 10 of the 20 sports and must be considered threats in at least seven of them.

If they choose, the Russians can enter boxing, basketball, weight lifting, soccer, wrestling, gymnastics, men's track and field, women's track and field, men's swimming and women's swimming.

They have announced they are applying for membership in the International Shooting Union and might make further bids before July.

The other sports—canoeing, cycling, equestrian, fencing, field hockey, modern pentathlon, rowing, water polo and yachting—so far are closed to them because they haven't joined the International Sports Federations.

Just how strong their teams will be this year remains to be seen. They should have a good deal to say in deciding titles in boxing, basketball, weight lifting, soccer, men's swimming and in men's and women's track and field.

Above all should come the Russian soccer team. Soccer is a tremendous spectator sport in Russia and since, at least in theory, all Russian athletes are amateurs, the No. 1 national team will qualify for Helsinki.

McGregor Beats U. S. Tennis Ace

ADELAIDE, Australia (AP) — Dick Savitt's bid to retain his Australian national tennis championship failed Friday. The big American from Orange, N. J., waged a valiant, but losing semi-final battle before Australia's Ken McGregor. He was beaten, 6-4, 6-4, 3-6, 6-4.

Thus Savitt's hopes of meeting Frank Sedgman, the Aussies' No. 1 player in the final on Monday and demonstrating that possibly a mistake had been made in leaving him off the American team in the Davis Cup challenge, went up in smoke.

Sedgman showed his best form of the tournament in taking only 53 minutes to drub his southpaw countryman, Mervyn Rose, 6-2, 6-4, 6-2.

Sedgman and McGregor completed a victorious day for the Aussies by trouncing Savitt and Hamilton Richardson, of Baton Rouge, La., 6-2, in the fifth and deciding set of their postponed semi-final doubles match. The doubles match had been called because of darkness Thursday after each side had won two sets. The final score for the Aussies was 6-3, 3-6, 4-6, 6-3, 6-2.

Bad Eyes Don't Hinder Bowler

PATUXENT, Md. (AP) — S. H. Chasen can barely see beyond the end of his nose but he has a 150 average in the Men's Handicap Bowling League at the Navy's Patuxent Air Test Center.

"It's primarily a matter of throwing a consistent ball," Chasen says. He is not totally blind, but a deterioration of the retina which started in 1945 while he was in the Navy resulted in split vision. He can see a little bit to either side, but nothing straight ahead.

Despite this, he rolled a 214 game in the league on Jan. 18. Last fall he had a 235 game in a non-league session.

How does he do it? He can see well enough out of the corners of his eyes to get himself lined up with the alley. After the first ball in a frame, those playing with him tell him the numbers of the pins still standing. He counts the boards on the floor to get himself in position and whips the ball down the alley.

Soviet Pledges Aid To Peoples Of Middle East

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — An Egyptian newspaper correspondent reported Wednesday that Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky told him Russia will assist all Middle Eastern peoples "to free themselves of Western economic domination."

The statement was published by Al Misri, a pro-government paper believed to have the largest circulation in the Arab world.

It said Vishinsky gave his views to its correspondent in a Paris interview.

Al Misri said Vishinsky declared: "The unity of Middle Eastern peoples and their combined efforts are the obstacles halting Western military preparations to turn these countries into bases of aggression. 'These peoples must say no' to all those who wish to make cannon fodder of them and try to make of them 'military equipment' by means of which they can reach their aim of dominating the world. 'The struggle of the peoples of North Africa and the Middle East, whether in Egypt or Iran or elsewhere, to win their freedom has begun to shake the foundations of Western domination.'"
