British Reinforce As Egyptians Riot

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Riotous mobs roamed Cairo's streets Saturday burning and crying for "revenge" against the British. Police said at least eight rioters perished and that scores were wounded as the mobs set fire to more than 25 buildings in the center of Cairo.

The Egyptian Cabinet reportedly has decided to sever diplomatic relations with Britain and Britain announced 11 British warships have been dispatched to the Suez Canal to help keep order.

Police fought the angry mobs in Cairo with tear gas, staves and shots fired overhead. The mobs cut hoses of firemen trying to extinguish the many blazes. Chased out by police, the mobs merely moved to other spots and set other fires. The police said most of the dead and injured were casualties of fires and splintered glass from store front windows.

Three Britons were reported killed in an attack on the exclusive British Turn Club in the center of Cairo. Several Englishmen were said to have been inside the club when the mob attacked and it could not be determined immediately whether there were any other casualties.

British Naval headquarters at Malta disclosed it sent one aircraft carrier, three cruisers, seven destroyers and a minelaying steamer swiftly to reinforce the battle torn canal zone after Friday's battle between British troops and Egyptian police.

The cruiser Liverpool and several destroyers already are there. A state of emergency was proclaimed in Cairo.

Angry police, brandishing rifles, joined a mob of 2,000 shouting: "Long live Russia, friend of Egypt."

More mobs pillaged and burned. The pro-government newspaper, Al Misri, said an emergency Cabinet meeting sitting late into the night decided to break relations with Britain.

There was no confirming announcement from the government, but an official from Premier Mustafa el Nahas Pasha's office told a mob, howling for revenge, it would hear of a "historic decision" Saturday or Sunday.

The wave of anti-British hatred swelled for a week and broke open after the battle at Ismailia Friday, when British troops used tanks and big guns to crush a police detachment and forcibly disarm it after six hours of bitter fighting.

Point Four's role against Communism, however, is only a "by-product," he continued, and the U.S. "should be carrying it forward even if there were no Soviet threat."

In a letter read at the dinner, President Truman also referred Point Four as "a fundamental part of our foreign policy."

Mixed Audience Applauds Negro

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Everything went off all right at Marian Anderson's first recital in Miami before a non-segregated audience.

Police gave the noted Negro contralto the greatest protection ever afforded a singer here during her concert Friday night in the Dage County Auditorium.

Law enforcement officers took every possible precaution to prevent an incident, remembering the recent dynamiting of a Negro housing development and attacks on worship.

Sixty plain-clothesmen, including men from the FBI, Miami and Dade County police departments, mixed with the audience. Unidentified persons were not permitted backstage.

About 2,000 persons, roughly 60 per cent Negro and 40 per cent white, sat in alternate rows in the auditorium which seats 2,501.

In a brief interview after the concert Miss Anderson said she thought the audience seemed very friendly. Her program, which included folk songs and Negro spirituals, drew prolonged applause.

Miss Anderson sang in Jacksonville before a non-segregated audience Wednesday night. Her contract will not allow her to perform before a segregated audience.

Douglas County Native Authors Best Seller

Captured AP Cameraman Sends Photos From Camps Holding Allied Prisoners

TOKYO (AP)—Frank "Pappy" Noel is taking pictures for the world's newspapers again.

The 52-year-old Associated Press photographer who disappeared behind the bamboo curtain after his capture by the Chinese Reds on Nov. 29, 1950, Saturday sent out a few photos taken inside a Communist prison.

"Pappy" took the pictures with a regular news camera, sent to him by bag, flashgun and all by another AP photographer, Bob Schultz of New Jersey.

Schultz gave his own camera to a Chinese news correspondent on Jan. 2, 1952. That began a fanciful chain of camera-passing which finally got the equipment all the way to Pyongyang, Communist Prison Camp Number Two. Pyongyang is south of the Yalu River on the cold Manchurian border.

Several Communist correspondents cooperated in the scheme, dubbed "Operation Father Christmas" because of "Pappy's" name and the time it was cooked up.

The Reds developed the pictures and made prints for their own censorship. The photos that survived were censored in Tokyo again by American censors. All passed.

The American soldiers snapped by "Pappy" appeared to be well clothed in padded Chinese uniforms. They were mostly smiling and looked well fed.

Burchett said this was "rice fat" from their diet of Chinese food. One American, PFC. Theodore M. Pallas of San Francisco, was being treated by a Chinese doctor and two nurses in a hospital. When his mother was shown the picture in San Francisco she burst into tears. "Thank God, thank God," she sobbed.

M. B. Emmitt Renamed Deputy County Coroner

M. B. Emmitt has been reappointed deputy coroner for the Roseburg area. He has served since 1946.

The official appointment was made by Coroner Holt Grimes, who has been named to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Harry C. Stearns who was coroner for 19 years.

The positions of all deputy coroners was terminated with the appointment of the new acting coroner until official appointments or reappointments have been made.

There is no salary connected with the deputy coroner position. He receives a small fee and mileage for each case on which he is called.

JUAREZ, Mexico (AP)—Police and Mexican troops killed one and captured three members of a bandit gang Wednesday and recovered \$174,000 which they took from a Juarez bank Tuesday.

Child Believed Kidnapped Found Slain In Gas Sump

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Police charged a 21-year old mother with first degree murder Saturday after she admitted her story of a kidnapping was a hoax, and led officers to the body of her 3-year old daughter.

Detective Capt. William Browne said Mrs. Jada K. Zader's other daughter, Vickie, 4, told them her mother walked both children to an oil sump near their home Wednesday and dropped 3-year old Sherrie into water at the bottom.

"Mommy put her hand over Sherrie's mouth and dropped her in," Browne quoted the little girl as saying. Earlier the mother had insisted the child was kidnapped.

But Friday night, after seven hours questioning, the mother, Mrs. Jada Z. Kader, suddenly screamed, "I didn't do it. I didn't do it. I'll lead you to her."

She then said that Sherrie had been killed when Vickie, her four-year-old sister, struck her with a concrete slab, police said. They said Mrs. Kader explained she dumped the body in the sump and made up the kidnap story because she became frightened.

Later she changed her story again.

Detective Bob McKeown said Mrs. Kader now says she thinks her Chinese stepfather, Eugene Sing with whom the family lived, killed the child. But she appeared to be extremely hazy about how the child actually died, McKeown said.

She said it was Sing who dumped the body into the nearby gas company's sump, McKeown said.

He quoted her as saying: "She made up the kidnap story after Sing had threatened her and her other daughter with 'hatchet men,' if she told the truth about Sherrie's death."

She got Vickie to believe that a gray-haired man had kidnapped Sherrie by taking Vickie outside and showing her a man getting into a car. She said she told Vickie that the man was taking Sherrie away.

Vickie had told police she pulled away from "the kidnaper" before he snatched Sherrie.

Police said they were holding Mrs. Kader, Sing, 45, and Mrs. Kader's mother, Mrs. Dorothea Sing, 44, as material witnesses.

Detective Captain William Browne said Sing denied all of Mrs. Kader's charges. Browne said questioning would continue Saturday.

The child's father, Arthur Vernon Dollarhide, 34, a tire repairman, walked into the San Francisco police station Friday when he learned he was being sought for questioning in connection with the disappearance.

He was en route to Portland when the body was found.

Two Airmen Foil Murderous Plot

FAIRFIELD, Calif. (AP)—Ralph Fong, 23-year-old Chinese rancher, was arrested here Friday night after two Travis Air Base policemen reported he had offered them \$1,500 to kill his wife.

Sheriff Thomas Joyce said the policemen told him Fong wanted to collect his wife's \$10,000 insurance policy to pay off debts on his ranch but "loved her too much" to kill her himself.

The young Chinese-American admitted the plot after he was booked at the Solano County jail on a charge of soliciting a person to commit a felony involving murder. The sheriff said.

The sheriff said Fong was arrested after a trap had been set and he and other officers watched the rancher give the airmen a 30-30 rifle and ammunition with which to do the job.

Joyce said that Fong picked up the airmen, who were hitchhiking back to their base, Monday and during the ride asked them if they'd like to make some money. When they said they would, Fong outlined the plan, Joyce said.

After the arrest, Joyce reported, Fong admitted he planned to have his wife seated before a lighted window Friday night so that the airmen could shoot her. Instead the two reported the plan to their commander, who in turn reported to the sheriff. The two military policemen were not identified.

Man Pays \$50 Fine For Leaving Child

Everett Haskell McClelland, Idlewild, pleaded guilty and paid a \$50 fine for leaving a child unattended in a car, upon arraignment in municipal court Saturday, reported Judge Ira B. Riddle.

The child was not his own, but he had been left to care for it while the mother was in the doctor's office, according to city police.

A fine of \$50 was also paid by William E. Feagins, Route 1, on a charge of failure to leave name and address at the scene of an accident, the judge reported. Feagins' car reportedly was involved with the parked vehicle of Mary Moore in Roseburg about a week ago. He was arrested by city police on a warrant.

Convict Returned To Face Charge

Ernest Lloyd Addington, about 28, will be released from the State Penitentiary Sunday — and will be returned to Douglas County to face a charge of escaping from custody in 1949.

Addington was jailed in Douglas County in 1949 on a charge of drunk driving and was sentenced to serve 30 days in jail. He escaped Aug. 26, 1949 from a trusty gang working at the fairgrounds—just four days before his 30 days were up.

He was thought to have gone to California, but all leads fizzled, the sheriff's office said.

Subsequently he turned up at the State Penitentiary, sentenced for three and one-half years on a Jackson County charge of larceny of livestock.

Douglas County Jailor William Kissingner will return Addington from the penitentiary. He will also take three others, recently sentenced here, to Salem to serve their penitentiary sentences.

The three are James L. Dezern, convicted of assault with a dangerous weapon; and Paul M. Newcomer, and Ethan Earl Billings, both convicted of obtaining money by false pretenses.

Busenbark suggests that the meeting is open to those engaged in agriculture production as well as members of the Chamber of Commerce.
