6-Nation Army Plan For Europe Faces Obstacles

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson said Wednesday the United States is most eager for a solution of differences holding up the proposed creation of a six-nation, all-European army.

Some very clear differences of opinion exist, Acheson told a news conference, but he believes these views can be reconciled.

At present, France, Italy, and Western Germany are pushing for a more centralized European defense force than the Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg are willing to accept.

In response to a question, Acheson discouraged any idea that Western Germany might be brought into the North Atlantic Pact as a sixteenth member.

He said he did not think he could make any hopeful comment about that at this time.

A German correspondent, in asking Acheson a question, had said Germany's deputy foreign minister had made the suggestion.

OTHER PHASES NOTED

Acheson made these other points: 1. The United States has been unable to work out a satisfactory military aid pact with Iran because Prime Minister Mossadegh is objecting to conditions tied to this aid. Negotiations are still going forward through Ambassador Loy Henderson in Tehran.

Iowa Governor Squares Up His Tax Deficiency

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department said Friday there will be no criminal prosecution of Republican Gov. William S. Beardsley of Iowa for his income tax deficiencies.

The Department announced it concurred with a recommendation of the Bureau of Internal Revenue that no prosecution should be undertaken.

The case has been returned to the Internal Revenue Bureau for civil disposition.

The Governor said last summer that there was no willful tax evasion on his part. He told reporters he had given the government a \$13,000 check for back income taxes.

He said he had paid \$8,000 in back taxes and \$5,000 in penalties and interest covering the period from 1944 through 1949.

The ceremony, brought to light Monday, took place before a local mayor Jan. 17, where Yolene, before witnesses, said her "oui."
