White Potatoes' New Markup Effective Now

WASHINGTON (AP)—Limited percentage markups, aimed at reducing prices of white potatoes, went into effect in retail stores Monday. These markups follow the fixing of price ceilings at the farm level Jan. 19.

The Office of Price Stabilization estimates the reductions might average 5 to 10 percent at the farm levels and slightly less than that to consumers.

An OPS official told a reporter the amount of reductions at retail will depend on how current markups of individual stores compare with those set by OPS.
