

### X-Ray Campaign In Camas Valley Described Good

About 60 per cent of Camas Valley residents were X-rayed Tuesday and Wednesday when the Douglas County chest X-Ray mobile unit was in Camas Valley. Of the 325 adult residents, 358 received an X-ray. The examiners said they were satisfied with the turnout considering the deep snow in some parts of the valley.

Six local women worked two hours each as registrars. They were Mrs. Wilmer White, Mrs. Lee Banks, Mrs. Dave Thrush, and Miss Judy Counts. Leon Ash-ton and J. A. Combs were the transportation committee, and hostesses were Mrs. Guy Moore and Mrs. Art Jones. The oldest people to receive an X-ray were Mr. Jess Kirkendall, 81 and Mr. Hiram Thrush, 80.

The X-rays will be developed at the Veterans' facilities in Roseburg, and cards will be mailed out with the results sometime in the next two weeks, according to Mrs. Guy Moore.

### W. W. Hallcraft Leaves For New Navy Service

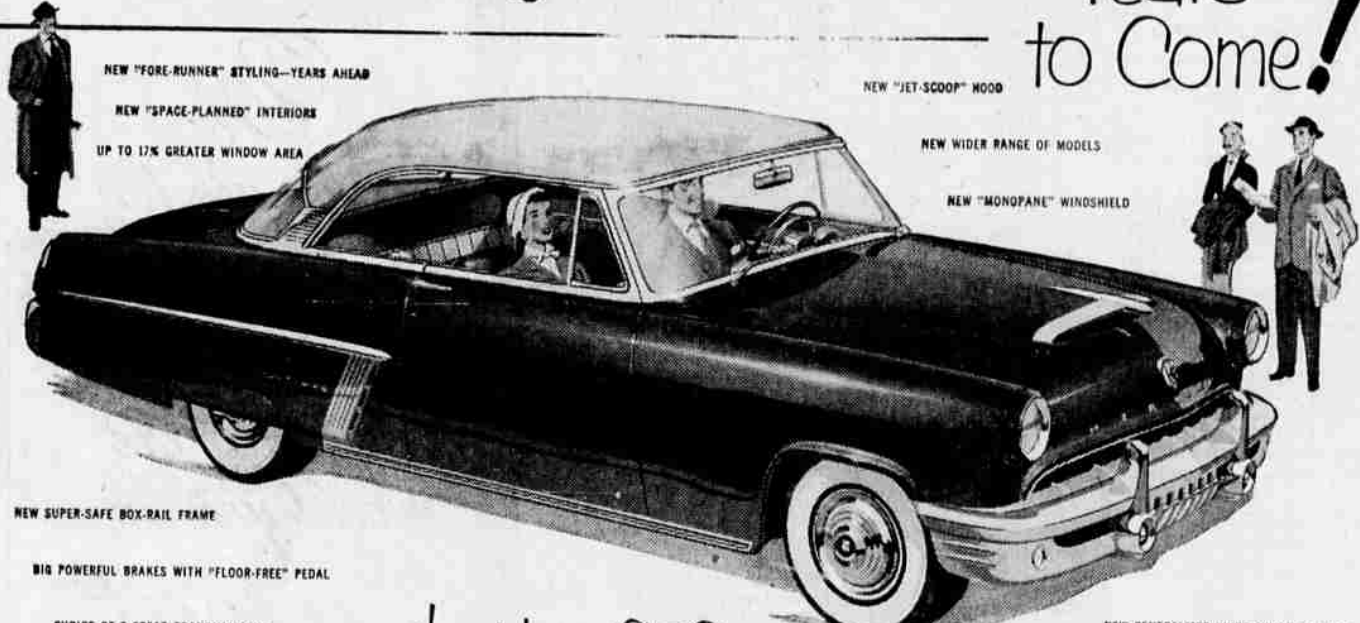

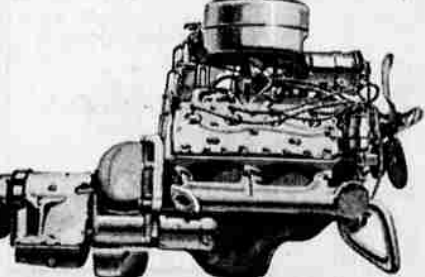
