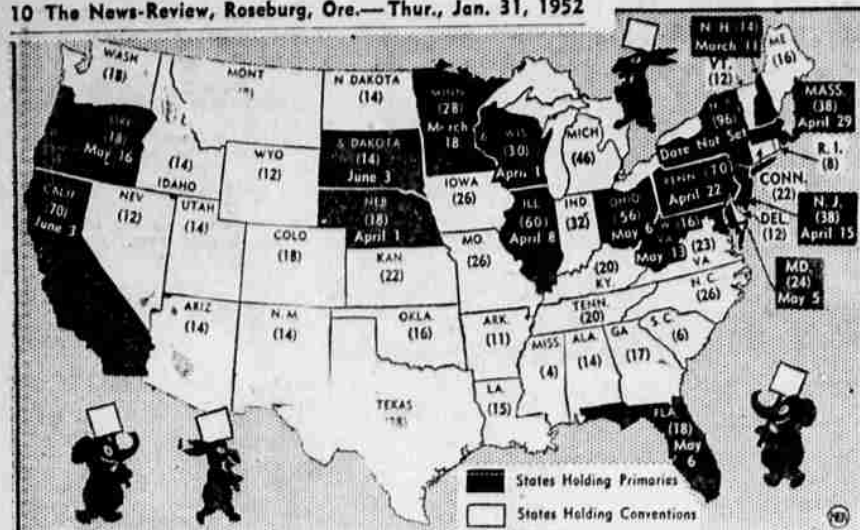

CONSTITUTION SAYS SO

But Do People Really Own Government, Run By Politicians? Question

WASHINGTON (AP) — Me. I get confused. "We the people..." it says right here in something I am reading. Constitution, they call it. Bunch of bigwigs got together a long time ago in Philadelphia and wrote it out. Pretty hot stuff.

"We the people..." it says, meaning, I take it, we the people own the government. I guess that includes me because I pay taxes, too.

But sometimes I wonder. Sometimes I ask myself: Just whose government do the politicians think this is?

I know politicians run the government. Guys like me elect them. I don't like them much. Never have. Too many of them get too big for their britches. Every time guys like me elect them it's like using a bicycle pump on them. It puffs them up.

But I guess I haven't got too much right to complain. Somebody's got to run the government. So guys like me elect them to take care of the details while I make a living.

Of course, they make a pretty good living off my living. But that's all right so long as they remember who's paying them and the government belongs to guys like me, as well as to them.

Soliloquy on Stealing

Something just came up to make me think. This talk about stealing in the government. Internal revenue, particularly. Burns me up. Guys playing around with my money. "Clean 'em out," I says. And I really mean clean 'em out. So President Truman sends a plan to Congress to make internal revenue cheaper to run and cut down on the chances for stealing.

Nobody been talking louder about cleaning out internal revenue than Congress and now all of a sudden, I read in the papers, Congress gets a big chill. It begins to look like a man who suddenly got a forkful of mud when he ordered gravy. Seems this is the trouble: There are 64 internal revenue collectors and a whole bunch of offices scattered around the country. Mr. Truman wants to cut down on the offices and cut the 64 collectors to 25. But that's not all.

Prerogative Threatened

As it is now the senators can name all 64 collectors—guys that did them favors or put up dough for their campaign, or something. Anyway, they can name all 64 and the President appoints them for the senators. But under the new plan the senators couldn't appoint even one. All 25 would be regular government civil service people who got promoted to collectors because they been doing good work. So if the senators okayed this idea they'd be knocking themselves out of 64 political friends or

political pay-offs. So they get a chill. Or some of them do.

Vet's "Widow," Remarried, Told No. 1 Still Alive

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army has straightened out its records on Pvt. Walter B. Dixon, a war prisoner in Korea whose bride remarried after he was reported killed in action.

Maj. Gen. William E. Bergin, Army adjutant general, wired Mrs. Dixon Sunday that her husband's name has been transferred from the "killed in action" to the "captured" list.

In Atlanta, the 22-year-old wife said she had not yet seen the telegram.

She declined further comment, but expressed surprise when told that a hearing on annulment of her second marriage, originally scheduled Monday had been postponed indefinitely.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some two million families are struggling on unproductive farms when the United States needs more food and more industrial workers, says the National Planning Association.
