

Billy Graham Brings In 236 More Converts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Billy Graham's plea to "give in to Christ" brought forth 236 persons as converts Tuesday night, the most at one time in the evangelist's 2 1/2-week old capital crusade.

Every seat in the National Guard armory, which has an 8,000 legal capacity, was filled. Some 200 persons stepped forward at the young preacher's call for professions of faith. A score or more followed when he said:

"I'm giving just 30 seconds more to those people with one foot in the Kingdom of God. Whoever you are, you must give in to Christ tonight."

Graham's topic was "Judgment" and he used the story of Noah and the Ark as an illustration. He said Noah repeatedly warned sinners to repent. They listened too late, he said, after "the judgment of the Lord fell upon them" in the form of the great flood.

The revival is to continue through Feb. 10.

Traffic In Dope Topic Of Address 90-And-9 Meet

A talk on narcotics by John Blanchard, laboratory technician at the Veterans Hospital, and a general discussion on juvenile delinquency, led by William Unrath, featured the Christian Church 90 and 9 Men's Fellowship meeting Monday evening in the church basement.

About 45 were present. George Wright, president, conducted the meeting, and entertainment included piano numbers by Jerry Feldkamp.

Blanchard explained the wide use of narcotics in a modern setting showing the dangers to our youth as they are being ensnared in so many of our larger cities. Main points the speaker emphasized were: Narcotics are a derivative of opium. In its various forms it is sold and used under the name of cocaine, marijuana, heroine, codine, morphine and Indian hemp. Some of these narcotics may be smoked, as is opium. Others are injected into one of the veins, or into the rectum.

Narcotics affect the central nervous system, impairing its functions, causing excitement and excess impulses and a vivid imagination. It is generally considered that narcotics are a stimulant. The speaker said, "They are not." "They are a depressant," and he ably supported this assertion.

Addicts Classified

Adolescent boys and girls are the first to become victims as the vendor uses special tactics in persuasion to get them started, said Blanchard. These children make up the largest percent of addicts. Women users come second. The third group are men and women from age 30 to 39. Very few persons become addicts after 50 years of age.

Blanchard said, "Sometimes women during childbirth are given a narcotic, and when the baby is born it will show all the symptoms of an addict."

Some infants are led to become addicts later in life, through the use of paragonic for colic. Many people become addicts by using a narcotic to reduce pain. Others begin the use of it because of strain or fatigue. A confirmed addict needs \$8 to \$15 worth each day.

The raw narcotic product is obtained chiefly from Italy, Turkey Iran and adjacent territories. It is sold in America to agents in kilo lots. A kilo being 2.2 pounds. The price is \$1000. When this is worked over into various forms it is valued at \$7000. When the product is further reduced and modified the price of the original kilo will sell up to \$200,000. There are some 15 derivatives of morphine.

The sale of narcotics is illegal in drug stores. It is handled by individual vendors who attempt to sell secretly. Blanchard stated that there are several thousand vendors in Los Angeles. Each of these supplies from 30 to 40 addicts.

In the U. S. the government has only about 200 official agents trying to apprehend and stamp out this illegal sale of narcotics. This number is entirely too few.

Local Increase Evidenced

The local official interest in this subject was shown in that there were present in this meeting three deputy sheriffs, two city policemen and former city chief of police, Calvin Baird.

After nearly an hour of questions and discussion, William Unrath spoke on the situation in Douglas County regarding the many juvenile cases. He stated that the county needs more officers to look after the juvenile offenders. He said there are some 75 juvenile parolees listed in this county. If it were possible for officers to give one hour per day to looking after these cases it would require a total of 75 hours, which time can scarcely be taken from their regular duties. District Attorney Robert G. Davis asked that additional officers be sought and that social groups, lodges and clubs give attention to this problem.

This matter will be followed up in the March 90 and 9 meeting.

Engraved Plate From Athens Lodge Is Presented To Roseburg Masons
