Harold Smith, Oakland's one-man tower of scoring strength added a tenth of a point to his average this week to hold a head-and-shoulders lead over the rest of the Umpqua Valley AAU League basketball pack.

He rang up 23 points against Glide Wednesday night to hold his average steady at 22.4, over four points better than Yoncalla's center Dick Strait. Strait added 11 points to his average with his 20 point performance against the J. C. Sporting Goods squad Wednesday. This held him in the runner-up spot, but the rest of the runs on the scoring ladder were shifted haphazardly.

The big noise in the league this week was Jack Loomis, who poured in 28 points against Yoncalla. It was good enough to add over two points to his average and hoist him into third place from sixth last week. Wally Richardson dropped to fourth from third, being idle up to Wednesday night. J. C. Don Hubbard dropped from fourth to sixth, while Glide's Jack Harvey remained steady in fifth.

TUCSON, Ariz. — Hungry newcomers and last year's big money winner were in the field Friday chasing Cary Middlecoff, Memphis, Tenn., and Jimmy Clark, Laguna Beach, Calif., in the second round of the \$10,000 Tucson open golf tourney.

Joe Louis, the ex-heavyweight champ, played his best big-time golf Thursday. He led the amateur field which includes Frank Stranahan, Toledo, O., with a neat 69.

NEW YORK (AP)—Ted Williams' future in baseball still is as hazy to him as it is to everyone else.

The Boston Red Sox slugger, en route to Boston where he will appear in a sportsman's show, said Friday nothing definite has been decided as to whether he will take part in spring practice or appear in early-season games prior to his physical examination for return to service as a captain in the Marine Air Corps.

"Any speculation as to my future in baseball after my service is pure speculation and not worth the breath," he added.

Williams, should he pass the physical April 2, will report May 2 for active duty.

Game-Fixer Melchiorre Gets Year's Probation

PEORIA, Ill. (AP)—The Circuit Court decreed a year's probation Thursday for Gene "Squeaky" Melchiorre, former Bradley University basketball star who admitted fixturing in game-fixing activities.

Melchiorre had pleaded guilty to an indictment charging failure to report a bribe to shave points from Bradley's score in a game won 77-44 from Oregon State here in December, 1950.

Three other Bradley players had admitted sharing in a \$4,000 payoff. Melchiorre was the only one indicted.

Scolari, Howe Will Bolster Red Devil Five

The Roseburg Indian basketball wars return to the local court tonight at 8 for the first time since Jan. 18 when Reedsport dropped the Indians to sub-district second with a 48-40 decision.

Tonight they host the Coquille Red Devils with nothing but revenge at stake. The Devils are part of the same District 5, but play in the opposite sub-district league. In spite of its kings'-x flavor, however, the Indians are chafing under the upset 42-40 defeat the Devils handed them earlier in the season.

A slight recap of that game on the Coquille court might explain why the Indians are so set on revenge. They were leading by 15 points in the first half and appeared to be coasting to an expected easy victory. That was in the first half. In the second, the Indians fell apart. By the last two minutes of the game, the Devils had tied it up, and with a minute and 25 seconds to go, they went ahead for the first and last time to win the game.

Average About Same

The Devils will floor a starting five averaging in at about the same height as the Indians. At forwards will be Len Scolari at 6-11½ and Bill Willard at 5-11. This is a perfect height match for Bruce Dalros at 6-2 and LeRoy Elting at 5-11 for the Indians. Center Allen Dungey is 6-2½, just a hair more than Jim Gilbert's 6-2 for Roseburg. The guards are Bob Sweeney (5-9) and Ed Howe (6-1). Here, where doesn't count so much, the Devils hold plenty of height over Ralph Rudzik and Ed Noite, Roseburg's watcharm guards, who stand 5-8 apiece.

The big Coquille scoring guns are Scolari and Howe. Scolari averages in the vicinity of 15 points a game and Howe, 10. The former is a hook shot artist par excellence. Although he made only 11 against Roseburg, he put on his greatest show of the year against Marshfield two weeks ago when he poured in 24 points.

Still fighting at half strength after a siege of flu and colds, the Roseburg Froshmen didn't have the oomph to fight more than a holding battle and as a result lost a game to Grants Pass Thursday, 42-26.

The Papooses held up well in the first quarter, holding the lead for the distance and staying on top at the first breather, 9-7. But in the second quarter, they really wilted to allow Grants Pass' Froshmen to free wheel into a ponderous lead by halftime. The local freshmen met Grants Pass on even terms through the third and most of the fourth quarters never letting the lead go over 10 points. But with four minutes to go in the game, the strain was too much and Grants Pass shot away.

Four of Coach Hal Zurcher's top men could only play at half speed because of weakening cold ailments. They were Howard Backen, George Donnelly, Paul Hatcher and Milford Biddington. All were starters at one time or another during the year.

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Will Walcott Meet Harry?

IBC Threatens Champ's Crown If Fight Slated

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Jersey Joe Walcott's immediate future as world heavyweight champion will be discussed at a conference here Saturday. It appeared more than likely that the verdict will be a return fight with Ezzard Charles.

Walcott's manager, Felix Bocchicchio, kicked up a verbal storm when he announced Thursday that he had agreed tentatively to a title bout with Harry "Kid" Matthews in Las Vegas, Nev.

This brought a prompt statement in Miami from Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, (that he would not release Walcott from his contract with the IBC to give Charles a return match.

Added Al Weill, the IBC matchmaker:

"Walcott is going to fight Charles for the title first. If he doesn't, he'll be sued for every penny he owns. And he's going to have to sign by Feb. 5 or get suspended and forfeit the title."

Norris is scheduled to get together here with Bocchicchio and Charles' managers, Jake Mintz and Tom Tannas.

Bocchicchio told newsmen at a press conference in Washington that Harry Hunt, a Los Angeles promoter representing Wilbur Clark, a Las Vegas hotel operator, had offered to "give us \$250,000 and give me 50 per cent of everything" for a Walcott-Matthews fight.

He said he would go to Miami to talk to Norris and added that Norris would have to match or better Hunt's offer to get the Walcott-Charles fight.

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
