

Electric Co-op Slates Meeting

The annual meeting of the Douglas Electric Co-operative, Inc., will be held in the Roseburg Armory Feb. 4. The public is invited, and registration begins at 11 a.m.

A free lunch of sandwiches, salad, ice cream, cookies and coffee will be served from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. A number of door prizes will be given away during the day's meeting.

At 1 p.m., the meeting will be called to order. There will be reports, talks, chart reviews and discussion of old and new business.

During the day, directors will be elected. Directors of districts one and two will be elected for one year; districts three, four and five—two years, and six and seven—three years.

District candidates for directors are: district one, J. H. Parrott and James Combs; district two, Neal Meyer; district three, J. E. Young; district four, Chester Rydell; district five, D. C. Wilson and J. H. Schoss; district six, Norman Compton, and district seven, Harry W. Norton.

Beginning this year, directors will be elected for three-year terms.

built for 400 students, would not be as expensive, because not as much special equipment or as many special departments would be needed.

At average rates, quoted by the State Board of Education, high schools cost about \$1,500 per pupil to construct — \$425,000 to \$600,000 for the 350-400 pupil high school that would be needed.

And at the average rate of \$15,000 for elementary classrooms, the eight additional rooms needed on Green and Dillard schools would total some \$120,000, the spokesman said.

Thus far nothing has been heard from Umpqua District, the seventh district that voted down the consolidation proposal last Dec. 14. It was believed the Umpqua District board feels it can better be served by Sutherlin High School, Supt. Elliott said.

Legal Tangle Besets Hearing In Child's Death

PORTLAND — Mrs. Jada Z. Kader, 21, who a week ago was charged with murdering her little girl, Sherrie Ellen, was up for the second day of preliminary hearing in municipal court Saturday.

Usually a routine affair, the hearing for Mrs. Kader opened Friday afternoon with the courtroom jammed and her attorneys sparring with the two state witnesses called.

There was a legal tangle, too, and Municipal Judge John J. Quinn recessed court without ruling on the defense demand that four detectives, a policeman and a physician be called as defense witnesses.

Purpose of the hearing is to determine whether there is enough evidence against Mrs. Kader to warrant holding her to the grand jury.

Friday as the hearing opened she appeared pert beside a white clad nurse. As the afternoon wore on she became increasingly nervous and when the recess came and she was led away to a jail cell instead of the hospital, her lipstick was gone, her hair was tousled and her face was pale.
