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QUICK ACTION NEEDED

The Bureau of Land Management has a difficult problem on its hands.

Approximately 700,000,000 board feet of timber needs immediate salvage in the Pacific Northwest. This is timber damaged by fires and by the unusually severe windstorms within the past year. Unless salvaged, this timber creates a critical fire hazard, offers a breeding place for beetles and other insects which will damage surrounding green stands, while presenting, at the same time, a possible heavy loss in merchantable supply.

The BLM has an annual allowable cut. Many communities are dependent upon sales conducted in their respective areas. Unless normal sales are continued, those communities will suffer. Consequently it is not practical to confine sales exclusively to salvage. Salvage work should be carried on in addition to the normal program.

Much labor is involved in preparing sales. Timber must be cruised, roads engineered, contractual details prepared, sales advertised, etc. This work requires manpower. Men must be paid. The BLM budget is set up for normal activities only. No provision is made for emergencies such as that with which the agency is confronted.

Appropriations to pay the BLM's operating expenses are made by Congress. Congress is economy-minded — and rightfully so — but is slashing right and left, sometimes without adequate study of results. Requests for additional appropriations to permit emergency timber salvage may have hard sledding in view of the present attitude of Congress.

More Money Desperately Needed

If the BLM is to handle the salvage problem in addition to its essential normal cutting program it must employ many more men. To pay those men it will need more money. That money must come from a Congress determined to cut down on expenses, especially with a presidential election in the offing.

It may not be politically expedient to increase the BLM budget, but we believe Congress will be penny wise and pound foolish if it fails to provide funds with which to recover materials equivalent to an amount sufficient to build 70,000 homes. Furthermore, if this timber is not harvested as rapidly as possible, it can endanger more billions of feet of merchantable stands by encouraging fire, infestation and disease.

Any money appropriated to meet this emergency would be returned to the federal government many times over in taxes.

If we salvage the fire-damaged and wind-thrown timber, in addition to the normal cut, logging and milling operations will be crowded to capacity to handle the raw material. This would mean more jobs, more industrial activity, more man hours. On increased industrial activity the federal government would collect personal income and corporation taxes far exceeding the cost of the necessary emergency appropriation. But the unrealistic approach by Congress to the management of the federal domain in the Pacific Northwest makes it questionable whether emergency factors can be made to outweigh political expediency.

Bureau of Land Management officials are in a considerable dither concerning their critical problem. From the level of community advisory boards through to the office of the Secretary of Interior, the matter is getting serious study.

Quick action is essential and quick action is something hard to obtain from Washington.

intimate to the Paris baby couturiers that you have \$28,000 that you're willing to part with, and they'll do the rest. Quick! — Before you can change your mind.

Thought No. 2:
How could the ruler of a poverty-stricken, disease-ridden, downtrodden people such as the modern Egyptians even THINK of blowing \$28,000 for a layette for his first-born son?

That one's easy, too. All you have to do is to picture for yourself the abuses of power that have arisen down in that corner of the world where for thousands of years too much power has been held in too few hands too long.

When too much power is held in too few hands TOO LONG, anything can happen — especially anything bad.

At this point, I'd like to lay a little bet — which I can't hope to live long enough to win:

If in this country — the greatest and the freest and the most universally top-to-bottom prosperous on earth — we leave too much power in too few hands too long, we'll sink into a situation not essentially dissimilar to that of present-day Egypt.

There are few exceptions to that law of history.

Congress Chat

Our great Federal government has a wondrous and complicated system for getting ready to send to Congress, via the President, its request for money — and the request must be made annually. In other words, the whole system functions each year. The President has just recently submitted his budget to Congress. He says in his message that he must have \$85.4 billions to spend between July 1, 1952 and June 30, 1953.

It is called the fiscal '53 budget. The way the budget-making system works is something like this: Each government department or agency has what is generally called its budget officer.

This person gathers up the figures which, when tallied, indicate the amount of money needed (or at least wanted) by the department for the coming fiscal year. The figures are taken to the head of the department who looks them over and then decides just how much he will request. That figure does not, however, go to the President — it goes to the Bureau of the Budget. There, bright young men hold what they call hearings at which the departments explain why they need the amounts requested. Then the Bureau of the Budget prepares the figures to be submitted to the President and by him to the Congress. He, and his White House staff, are the last word in the budget-making process, and often is, changed materially from the way it comes from the Bureau, before it is brought to Congress.

From time to time I have discussed budget-making with people from the Executive departments. It seems to be quite a game which some of the old-fashioned department heads haven't learned to play very skillfully. The general scheme seems to be to ask the budget officer for about twice what you hope to get. Then the head of the agency will lop off ten or fifteen percent. The Bureau of the Budget will peel it another thirty percent. The Congress will probably knock off another ten percent and there you are — just what you hoped to get!

One complaint I heard about the Bureau of the Budget was rather more amusing than disturbing. It seems the young fellows who conduct the hearings and who no doubt, have a great deal to do with making the final figures, are very young — most of them under 30 and with little or no background (this is merely repeating what was told to me by one who faces them). They sit and ask uninformed and inconsequential questions. That might not be so bad, said my informant, but, as he put it, the trouble is they change these youngsters every year so that the school-teaching has to be done all over again each time. I gather, from the sigh he heaved, that the procedure is something of a headache, and tiresome.

It generally takes Congress quite a long time to catch up with the activities of our Executive department officials. This is especially true with respect to those things we do overseas. For instance, I learned unofficially and off the record, from one of our people in France last fall, of the neat scheme the French government works to chisel a profit over and above our aid to them. One example — the French share of the cost of the headquarters building for the NATO army is 18 percent. However, the French government levies a tax of 20 percent on the construction. See? In addition to saving her 18 percent contribution, France came up with a profit of two percent on the job. A neat trick if you can do it, and France has been doing it to us for years. Last week the Congress took notice of this situation and a committee has issued a sharp and factual report on the subject. The State Department says it is "working on the problem!"

It points out, among other things, that you can't handle modern people with a club — or with a naval squadron if you want to handle modern people, Carnegie says, you have to MAKE THEM LIKE YOU.

Over the great years of the British Empire, your British never quite succeeded in making people like you. As a matter of fact, in the explosive Near and Middle East and in dynamite-laden South-east Asia, most of the trouble that hangs heavy over our heads arises from the fact that the people DON'T like you.

They like you so little that they're willing to HURT THEMSELVES in order to hurt you worse.

Give some thought to it, Mr. Churchill. If, by some magic, you could make the people of that part of the world LIKE the British instead of hating them a lot of our worries would be lessened.
