

Roseburg High Band Performs On Wednesday

Roseburg Senior High School's band will present its annual winter concert at the Senior High School auditorium Wednesday at 8:15 p.m. The band is directed by E. G. Stiles.

The program will be in three parts. The concert opens with the band playing a selection from Cesar Franck's "Pavane Anglaise." This will be followed by Sigmund Romberg's "The Student Prince" overture; F. H. Losey's "Gloria," world famous march; cornet duet, "Punch and Judy," by George Barnard, played by Barbara Marsh and Leola Lorenzen; Feist band medley of popular standard favorites, and concluding with "The Army March," arranged by Harry Alford.

Part II will feature the clarinet quartet playing three clarinet sketches, arranged by Don Cassel and L. Gearhard. They will play "Quartet," by Haydn; "Perpetual Motion," by Tchaikovsky, and "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot." The quartet includes Donna Fromdahl, Arlene Redmond, Kingsley Hubbell and Carolyn Pattison.

Next the trombone quartet John Duvall, Gale Anderson, Ralph Barker and John Rand, will play "All Through the Night" and "Oh! Dem Golden Slippers," arranged by Newell Long.

Justice Brand Defends Oregon Nonpartisan Act

PORTLAND (AP) — "The purpose of the Nonpartisan Act was to remove judges from politics," Chief Justice James T. Brand of the Oregon Supreme Court said Tuesday.

But he added in a letter to State Senator Richard Neuberger that the "matter of interpreting the spirit and underlying purpose of the act is one for decision by each individual judge."

Brand's opinion was asked by Neuberger, who criticized Associate Justice Walter L. Tooez for what the senator said was partisan political activity.

Tooez, a Republican, is a supporter of Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio for the Republican presidential nomination. He attended the Western Regional Republican Conference in San Francisco earlier this month.

Justice Brand, a Republican, told Democrat Neuberger he supported the canons of judicial ethics of the American Bar Association which said in part "It is inevitable that suspicion of being warped by political bias will attach to a judge who becomes the active promoter of the interests of one political party as against another."

"I see no reason why Oregon should lag behind the American Bar Association in a matter of this kind," he said.

Oregon judges run for office as nonpartisans.

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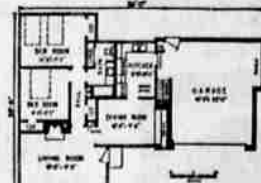
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
