

LeRoy Elting Sparks Indian Quint To 65-36 Victory Over Sutherlin

The only doubt Coach Dick Ballantyne had last night was how big a score his Roseburg Indians were going to run up.

As it was, the Indians scathed the hapless Bulldogs, 65-36, and Forward LeRoy Elting was blistering hot. In the two-plus quarters he was in, he accounted for 11 baskets and three free throws for 25 points, his greatest scoring performance of the year. In the rampant first quarter, he totaled 15 of his team's 25 counters.

The Indians came on the floor in high gear and shocked the doubt right out of the Thomases who saw the Bulldogs hold them to a 38-22 victory just three weeks ago. In just the time it took to dash down the floor, Elting whipped Bruce Dalros' lip in for a basket. Those three seconds set Elting and his Indians off on their biggest scoring spree of the year.

Scores Easily
Elting sank a free throw and

followed it with a long one hander. Ralph Rudzik broke the monotony by sinking one of his own, but Elting was back in a flash to take Larry Fisher's quick pass for another basket. Fisher himself scored the next two-pointers to run the score to 11-0.

It was just short of four minutes before Odie Hethcock broke the Sutherlin ice with a left-handed hook shot. Lee Leisinger followed seconds later with another basket to set the score at 11-4. That was the smallest difference in the game. Elting scored the next three baskets and added one more late in the quarter for his total of 15 in the period. The score by the first whistle was 25-6.

Ballantyne cleared the bench in the second and fourth quarters, but the Bulldogs could do little better than hold their own in these periods. They used a pressing defense against the subs and several times managed to station Kenny Wahl alone under the basket.

The Sutherliners chopped the lead to 12 points by halftime, but Ballantyne sent his first crew in again in the third quarter to build up the bulge again. Early in the fourth, Roseburg had a margin of 31 points with the score just doubled, 62-31. By this time the subs were again coming in thick and fast for both sides.

Simmons Shows
Although overshadowed by Elting's performance, a new figure began to take on interesting aspects in the final minutes of the fourth quarter. He was Cecil Simmons, a 5-10 junior, who showed signs of finesse as well as scoring ability.

Houbregs Holds High Average

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Washington's center, Bob Houbregs, is hitting the basket with 43.5 per cent of his shots, and is averaging 17.4 points a game, the Pacific Coast Conference commissioner disclosed Wednesday.

Houbregs scored 58 points last week-end for a season total of 122, and now has connected on 47 of 108 shots. His teammate, Frank Guiness, is second with a 13.3 average.

Trailing Houbregs and Guiness in scoring are Ken Hunt, Oregon, 11.8; Dan Johnson, Oregon State, 11.1; and Eric Roberts, Washington State, 11.0.

Top marksman is Idaho's Tom Flynn with 26 baskets in 30 tries for a 53.3 average, followed by Duane Enochs, Washington, 44.4, and Houbregs.

Bob Peterson of Oregon dominates the rebound department with a 15.8 average, with teammate Chet Noe next with 9.8.

Washington leads in team shooting from the floor with 213 field goals in 632 tries, while Oregon is tops in free throws with 105 out of 150 for 70 per cent.

Football Practice Time Reduced By New Rule
