

4 Prep Fives Win Impressive Victories

Four of the five top-rated teams in this week's Associated Press Oregon high school basketball poll won impressive victories Tuesday.

Central Catholic, ranked No. 1, and the five low bracket teams in the state's high 10, did not play.

Cleveland and Lincoln, rated second and third in the state, clung to their one-two standings in the Portland High School League.

Forward Jack Viskov tossed in 34 points to lead Cleveland to a 78-60 win over Franklin. It was

Cleveland's 14th victory in 15 games this year. The Ghosts are unbeaten in prep play, their only loss having been to the Portland U. Frosh.

As usual, seven-foot, one-inch Wade (Swede) Holbrook took high-scoring honors for the day. He registered 37 points in pacing Lincoln to a 60-39 victory over Benson.

This ran his season's total to 316 points in 14 games, of which Lincoln has won 12.

Bounces Back
McMinnville, upset by Hillsboro last week but ranked No. 4 in the state, bounced back with a 78-66 victory over a strong West Linn team. Don Porter, one of the state's highest scorers, posted 36 points for McMinnville, which ran its season record to 15 wins in 18 games.

Salem, ranked No. 5, defeated Corvallis, 49-42, for its 13th victory in 17 starts. Ralph Harding, Corvallis forward, registered 27 points.

The major Tuesday upset was scored by Junction City in beating Eugene, the class A district 6 leader, 62-40. The loss broke a 33-game winning streak in district play, dating back to 1949.

Jefferson of Portland, the 1951 Oregon champion, saw its chance to defend its title in the state tournament fade when beaten by Roosevelt, 58-54. The loss dropped Jefferson to fourth in the Portland League, which qualifies only its first and second place teams for the tourney.

(Dayton preserved its undefeated

prep record by swamping Yamhill, 74-14. Hillsboro bounced Beaverton, 51-46, while Tigard whipped Forest Grove, 74-46.

Reedsport, a coastal hoop power sank Waldport, 56-40. Springfield beat Willamette of Eugene, 63-55, and University of Eugene overwhelmed Cottage Grove, 57-39.

One of Tuesday's top individual performances was turned in by big Dave Sanford, who scored 30 points to lead Gresham to a 70-55 victory over Park Rose.

McFater Goes Route With Champ Carter

TORONTO (U.P.)—A 20-year old Canadian lad who wasn't rated a chance at going more than five rounds with New York's Lightweight Champion James Carter stuck around for the route Tuesday night in one of the best fights seen in these parts for years.

Even though he dropped a unanimous decision in the nine-round non-title clash, Toronto's Allan McFater put up a show that veteran fight followers termed his best ever. A crowd of 8,666 paid \$17,334.

Carter beat McFater to the punch most of the time, but the Canadian was never on the run. The Negro titleholder directed his attack at the Toronto fighter's mid-section, keeping him off balance with jabbing lefts and a lightning-like right cross.

Retrial Of Monk Case Is Sought

The State's case against Frank H. Monk, accused of embezzlement, was back in the hands of the State Supreme Court Tuesday. District Attorney Robert G. Davis filed a motion in the Supreme Court for recall of the court's mandate, just received here, and for issuance of a new mandate directing that a new trial be held.

Davis said the court's mandate made no mention of whether the case could be tried again.

At the same time, Circuit Court here sustained a district attorney's

motion to withdraw a former motion which asked permission to re-submit the case to the grand jury to begin trial proceedings over again.

Monk was convicted by a Circuit Court jury almost a year ago on a charge of embezzling \$257.25 lounge funds of the Patrick Kelly Post of Veterans of Foreign Wars.

The case was appealed to the State Supreme Court and the conviction was reversed on the contention that Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly's instructions to the jury were faulty.

Recipe for Valentine Cherry Pie

Sift 2 cups sifted Kitchen Craft Flour with 1 tsp. salt. Cut in 1/2 cup shortening till particles are size of small peas. Sprinkle with water (about 1/4 c.) a little at a time. Roll lightly. Use only enough to hold mixture together. Press into ball. Roll out face. Fit into 9" pie pan. Trim and flute edge. Prick well. Bake in a 450° F. oven 10 to 15 min. Cool. Roll out remaining dough for "envelopes." Cut rectangles (9" x 2"), leaving a wedge-shaped point on one side. Prick well. Bake about 8 min. on a cookie sheet in oven with pie shell. Cool.

Add 2 tsp. water and few drops red food coloring to 1/2 cup of confectioners' sugar. With a pastry tube decorate the "envelopes." Before serving, fill pie shell with cherry filling and place "envelopes" on pie by inserting the points into the filling.
