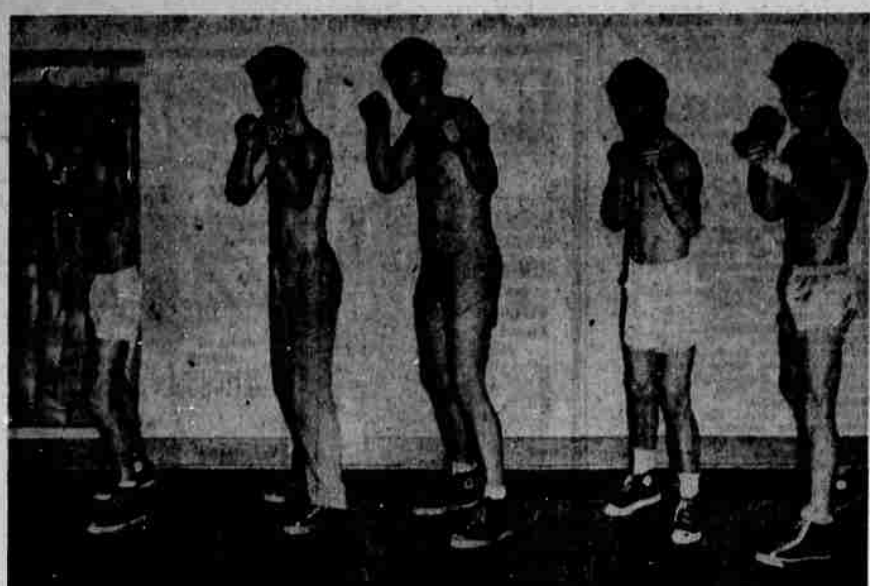

Salary Ceiling Relaxation Asked For Ball Players

NEW YORK (U) — John Kieran said Thursday he would recommend to the Salary Stabilization Board that its new order governing baseball pay ceilings be relaxed to meet critical situations.
Kieran, former sports columnist, served as a one-man panel at a hearing here Wednesday when baseball's legal representatives branded the government's policy as "unworkable."
The decree, issued Jan. 17, stipulates that a club's overall payroll budget for 1952, can't exceed that of 95. It also gives the club the privilege of fixing its salary scale on a formula based on any season's payroll between 1946 and 1950, plus ten per cent.

Fight Decision Draws Protests

DETROIT (U) — "We wuz robbed!" noise erupted out of both camps following a crowd-rousing middleweight battle between Robert Villmain of France and Eugene (Silent) Hairston of the Bronx Wednesday night.
Neither side liked the draw decision.
But most of the shrieking crowd of 7,859 at Olympia Stadium didn't seem to mind the officials calling the 10-round scrap all even. Rarely had two fighters smashed each other so continually and viciously in a Detroit ring.
Both Villmain, 164 1/2 pounds, and Hairston, 160 1/2, wanted the decision since the International Boxing Club had indicated the winner of this fight would get a shot at Champion Sugar Ray Robinson. So the draw nettled both men.
"My boy, he won," insisted unhappy Manager Jean Bretonnet in Villmain's dressing room. It was the story with Hairston getting the plaudits—in Hairston's quarters.
Hairston, a deaf-mute, appeared in charge in the early rounds. But the bull-like rushes and windmill punches of the stocky Frenchman caught up with him in the fourth.

Shotgun Ends Life Of Estranged Husband

EUGENE (U) — A wife's report that her estranged husband had fired at her with a shotgun at dawn Tuesday brought police swiftly. When they arrived, the husband was dead of a shotgun blast in the heart—possibly the result of stumbling in pursuit.
Police Capt. Harold Skipworth said the dead man was Irvin Watson, 54. Mrs. Watson, Skipworth said, told this story:
She left the family house to go to work at 6:30 a.m. Tuesday, and saw her husband in a parked car across the street. He fired a shotgun blast then started after her. She darted between houses and into a neighbor's where she called police.
Watson's body was in a back yard through which she had fled.

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P.G.E. Renews Request To Build Deschutes Dam

SALEM (U) — Portland General Electric Company, two years ago denied a license by the State Hydro-Electric Commission to build Pelton Dam, applied again Monday. The Federal Power Commission, with the approval of the Defense Production Administration, recently authorized PGE to build the Deschutes River power project.
At that time the company said it planned to begin construction in the near future, with or without the approval of the State Hydro-Electric Commission.
Monday however, a company spokesman said the firm wants to get the approval of the state. But he didn't say whether actual construction would await favorable commission action.
PGE's first application to the state was turned down after the State Fish Commission said the proposed dam might reduce salmon runs in the Lower Columbia. The Federal Power Commission disagreed. It said the fish runs might even be increased by the dam's related hatchery projects.

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WILL BE READY Improved Black Tornado Invades Indians' Court

It's a much more awe-inspiring Black Tornado that waits on the Roseburg High School court Friday night than the one the Indians defeated early in the season.
The Medfordites have practically set the courts afire in the southern Oregon camp since then. They currently lead district 4 competition with five wins and one loss.
