Acheson Gives Secret Report On Ransom Case

WASHINGTON — The Senate Armed Services Committee Tuesday got a hush-hush report from Secretary of State Acheson on why the United States decided to pay Hungary \$120,000 for the release of four American fliers.

The committee heard Acheson behind closed doors. Sen. Lyndon Johnson, D-Tex., the acting chairman, said afterwards the members would "no doubt give consideration to the information provided."

Johnson added that the committee had decided not to make public any of that information at this time.

"We got from Acheson his story of what happened and a somewhat detailed report of each move by the State Department leading to the release of these men," Johnson told reporters.

Another member who asked not to be named described the situation as "delicate" and said publicly could have a harmful effect. In reply to questions, he said there had been some discussion of what might happen if a similar case were to develop in the future.

In advance of Tuesday's meeting of the committee, Sen. Morse R-Ore., a member, said he wanted to ask Acheson about the reasons for the decision to pay and what alternatives were considered.

Don't Feed Wild Animals, Park Visitors Warned

WASHINGTON — No longer may visitors to the National Parks feed the wild animals.

Announcing this Tuesday, Secretary of the Interior Chapman said too many people are being attacked because of the mistaken belief that animals found in the National Park are tame and can be handled as pets.

"There are instances too numerous to mention where supposedly 'tame' wild animals turned on their benefactors," the National Park Service said in recommending the ban to Chapman, "more than one deer raised from a fawn has trampled or gored its owner to death."

The regulation prohibits "feeding, touching, teasing or molesting of any bear, deer, moose, bison, mountain sheep, elk or antelope. The service for some time has forbidden the feeding or bothering of bears."

It said bears "continue to present the principal problem of public safety."

Landlady Spurns Threat To Evict Negro Family

EUGENE, Ore. — A Eugene landlady refused Tuesday to evict a Negro family despite an anonymous telephone threat that the house would be burned down otherwise.

Mrs. Eggie Spencer, who rented the house to Mr. and Mrs. Leon Gasper and their two children Sunday, said she had received a number of complaints from neighbors. The Gaspers are the first Negroes in the district.

One telephone caller said the house would be burned if the family is not out by Tuesday night, Mrs. Spencer said.

"The Gaspers are good respectable people," she said, adding that she would not evict them. The Gaspers have an eight-month lease with an option to buy the house. It is located on the city outskirts

The Newschart above shows monthly pay and allowances to be received by selected ranks of the Army under the new 10 per cent pay boost bill already passed by the House. Members of the Navy, Air Force and Marines of corresponding grades will receive same boost. Allowances for enlisted men are figured for two dependents, and will vary with number of dependents. Rates for officers are figured for at least one dependent. In all cases, pay and allowances will be increased by "extras" such as flight pay, hazardous duty pay and increases for length of service.
