Friends Bail Out Once Noted Poet Afoul Of Law

NEW YORK (AP)—Two friends put up \$25 Tuesday to bail out Maxwell Bodenheim, once famous Greenwich Village poet-novelist held by Brooklyn police on a charge of sleeping in the subway. They said they were taking him to his favorite village cafe to read poetry.

The 61-year old Bodenheim, unkempt and seemingly bewildered, said he had no complaints.

"This is the first time in all my life I've ever been in jail," he remarked. "they were very nice, very courteous. I did not mind it a bit."

He was instructed to appear Feb. 11 to answer the charge.

Police said Bodenheim and six other men were arrested early Monday on disorderly conduct charges when they were found sleeping on subway seats. Had he pleaded guilty, Bodenheim could have gone free for a \$2 fine.

During his hey-day, 13 of Bodenheim's novels and nine volumes of his verse brought him fame. But he was on relief by 1935 and the same year was adjudged an acute alcoholic at Bellevue Hospital.

Woodburn Fugitives Injured In Crash

PORTLAND (AP)—Two boys escaped from the State Training School at Woodburn and were fleeing from police in a stolen car that collided with a truck at high speed here Wednesday.

Both were injured, as was the truck driver.

Patrolman John R. Caldwell said the two boys were in a station wagon stolen at Woodburn. He said the speed reached 65 miles an hour in the chase before the crash with the truck, which was making a left turn.

By coincidence the truck driver also from Woodburn. He is Roman F. Hoising, 32 (Route 1 Box 309) who suffered a shoulder injury.

The boys were James E. Fuqua, 15, and Leo Arns, 16, both of Portland. All were treated at Providence Hospital.
