Evangelist Uses King's Death To Stress Sermon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham used the death of King George VI to illustrate that "we never knew when we're going to meet our God."

The British King "was a great man and a mighty sovereign," Graham said Wednesday night. "He reigned over a commonwealth of

nations, but he couldn't stay the power of death." The British monarch died Wednesday.

The evangelist reeled off a long list of great Biblical and historical figures. He said they were mighty but they died, often suddenly.

"Not only are you walking on a thin edge—on the brink of an abyss, but all of us are dying in the midst of life," Graham said.

He told his audience of 10,000 persons that all they needed to prepare for death "is to open your heart's door and let Jesus Christ enter in."
