The two Rose grade school basketball squads completed the double round robin season Saturday morning without a single loss for either squad.

The Rose Pee Wees picked up win No. 6 by shellacking Riverside, 23-3, and the Heavies took surprisingly easy 23-10 triumph from Riverside. In the other two games of the weekend, Benson's Pee Wees dumped Fullerton, 19-10, and Benson's Heavies racked Fullerton, 20-7.

This is the last action in the league until Feb. 22 and 23 when the four schools schedule the all-city grade school basketball and volleyball tournament. Outside the league, the Rose Heavies added another win to their skein by dumping Myrtle Creek seventh graders, 18-16.

In the volleyball action last week, Fullerton remained undefeated by dumping the Junior High girls. Rose beat Benson in the other game.

Stalin Has Operation For Heart Trouble

ROME — The newspaper Giornale D'Italia said today in a story from Vienna that Soviet Prime Minister Stalin had been operated upon recently after a heart attack.

It said Stalin suffered from scurvy, diphtheria and typhus during the revolution and that these things contributed to weakening his heart. He is 72.

The dispatch cited no authority for its statements, but commented that a report published Jan. 12 in a Dutch newspaper, saying Stalin had undergone a heart operation last Dec. 19, had never been denied by Tass, the Russian news agency.

Sale Of Liquor Poses Problem In UMT Plans

WASHINGTON — Controversy over sale of intoxicants to 18-year-olds who may take universal military training indicates final selection of UMT training centers may be influenced by state liquor laws.

The Senate Armed Services Committee Friday received a "tentative list" of 17 Army, Navy, Marine and Air Force installations in 12 states where the six months of basic training for 18-year-olds could begin this year if Congress passes necessary legislation.

Senator Hunt, (D-Wyo), said he is confident the committee will approve the UMT bill as did the House Armed Services Committee. But there was a lot of talk about sale of beer and liquor to minors.

Officials setting up UMT testified the legal minimum age for sale of liquor in 11 of the 12 states is 21 years — well above the 18 year age of trainees. The 12th state, Oklahoma, is dry. The list of tentative training camps cited by Hunt does not include any in the Pacific Northwest.

W. Germany's Defense Price Snags Peace Try

BONN, Germany (AP)— Allied officials said Saturday West Germany's high priced demands for joining Western defense will set back a peace settlement with the ex-enemy and stall plans for welding German troops into a six-nation European army.

The price includes an end to Allied occupation, full sovereignty for Germany, an equal voice in Western strategic councils, and freedom for many German war criminals.

The restive parties in Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's government hung these conditions on their approval Friday night of Adenauer's proposal to recruiting 300,000 to 400,000 troops for Western defense.

The Bundestag (lower House) agreed to it only by the slim margin of 204 to 150.

Doesn't Mean Conscription

The vote was taken only on the principle of the proposal and does not mean immediate conscription of soldiers. That can come only after Germany agrees to a peace

settlement, joins the European army it has been negotiating over, and votes formal ratification of a defense bill ordering formation of troops and raising the money for defense.

Even with the "price tags" attached, the vote of approval was considerably smaller than that given Adenauer last month for ratification of Germany's entry into the Schuman Plan to pool her coal

and steel with five other Western European nations.

The powerful Socialists fought the army plan tooth and nail. The vote revealed a sharply-split Parliament reflecting sorely-divided public opinion.

The conditions themselves were sponsored by the parties in Adenauer's coalition, not by the opposition.

Corruption Charges Hit Red China Official

HONG KONG (AP)— The pro-Communist newspaper Ts Tung Pao reported Friday Communist China's anti-corruption campaign caught up last week with Tso Tung-Tao, director of the Kwangtung People's Government General Office.

A Canton dispatch said Tso was fired after his staff denounced him as "a capitalistic bureaucrat."

They accused him of: Building a ball room and swimming pool with government funds; Accepting bribes from "certain

enemies of the people; Throwing parties at government expense;

Running a \$500 "staff welfare fund" into a \$55,000 deficit.

Further, his accusers said, Tso "often shamelessly insulted the far

sex."
