To go into each dance number would be superfluous here, but suffice it to say the pantomime antics were clearly drawn. Comedy was cleverly interspersed with pathos.

Especially picturesque was the scene on Fifth Avenue, in which the inebriated gentleman fell in love with the window mannequin, who came to life. The concluding Carnegie Hall pantomime interpretations, with music accompaniment, caused the audience to call the dancing troop back for repeats in expression of their appreciation.

Camp Fire Girl Field Advisor Dates Local Visit

Before being appointed to her present post, Miss Armstrong was executive director of the Trenton, N. J., Camp Fire Council, where she was instrumental in developing a radio workshop in cooperation with local radio stations.

Cold Spell Ups Jobless Claims

The severe weather conditions during the early part of January created a sharp increase in claims for unemployment compensation in the Roseburg area. New claims increased approximately 25 percent over the previous month and 37 percent over the same period last year.

Continued claims increased 48 percent over last month and 43 percent over the same period last year, reports George Foster, manager of the Oregon State Employment Service office here.

During the last week of the month, when warmer weather moved in, many logging firms were able to resume their operations. This resulted in a steady decline of claims and would indicate that the peak for the year has been reached.

Employment opportunities are still at a low level. Many sawmills are operating on curtailed schedules because of a shortage of logs and it will probably not be until mid-March when the supply will equal the demand. Outside construction practically came to a halt during January, but as the weather improved, some jobs got under way again. The post-inventories lull in retail trade establishments became apparent during the latter part of the month. No great change in this field will take place until the Easter Season approaches.

There is a definite surplus of all types of labor on hand at the present time and it is suggested that employers take advantage of this fact to get those short jobs done now, while the workers are available, said Foster.

SILENT CANDIDATE

Abe Lincoln Proved That Presidency Could Be Won Without Campaign Talks

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Abraham Lincoln proved nearly a century ago that a man could win the Presidency without making campaign speeches.

An Illinois historian says the man who was to become the Great Emancipator refused to speak on the day's issues because he was afraid his words would be twisted. Those who pressed him were referred to his previous speeches and letters.

Dr. Harry E. Pratt, Illinois state historian, said in an interview Tuesday that Lincoln was unyielding in his resolve to "keep his mouth shut" during the 1860 campaign. Pratt quoted letters attesting to this.

Pratt said Lincoln even refused to address a political rally in Springfield which was preceded by a procession past his home. He attended, but kept his silence.

Angler Attempt Fails
Pratt related one effort of James Gordon Bennett, New York Herald publisher, to sting Lincoln to speech.

"Bennett was attempting to smoke Lincoln out and provoke him to anger so he would reply. He accused Lincoln of attending a 'Know Nothing' lodge meeting in Quincy, Ill.," Pratt said.

Lincoln wrote to Abraham Jonas, a Quincy attorney, and asked for affidavits from Quincy residents to settle the matter. But Lincoln cautioned: "It must not publicly appear that I am paying any attention to the charge."

Lincoln's campaign was conducted by a corps of speakers while their candidate sat in Gov. John Wood's state house office, which he took over for campaign headquarters, and received hundreds of politicians.

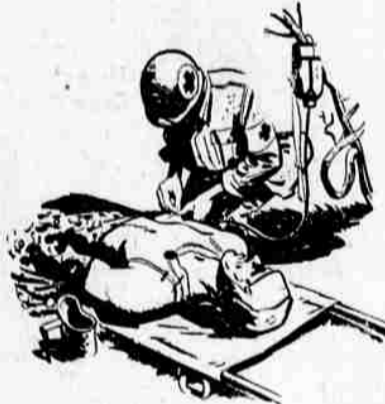
