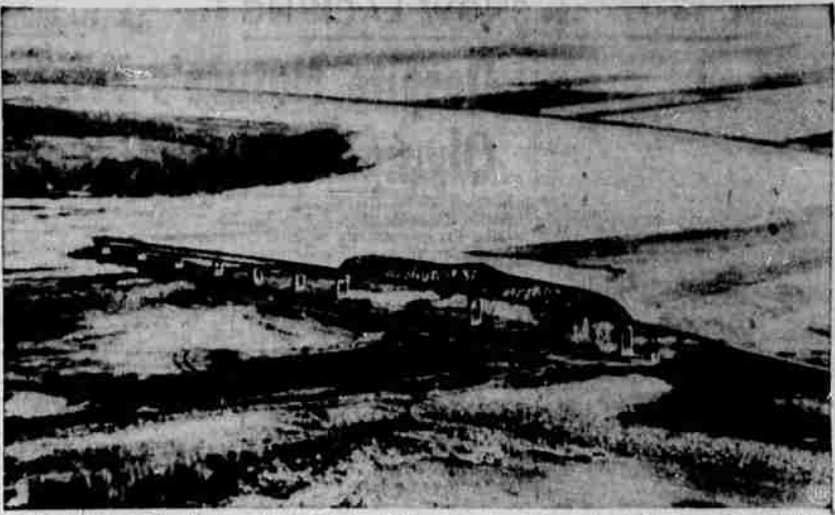

Actress Ignores Trial Date, Gets Rap From Court

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Up in Vancouver, Wash., actress Anne Sterling's ears may be burning.

In absentia, as they say in the courts, she drew quite a dressing down Friday from Superior Judge Jesse Frampton.

Miss Sterling accused Yolanda Ruth Elliott, 40, a costume designer of stealing a \$2,000 stone martin fur from her apartment Nov. 1.

Miss Elliott's trial was set for Friday. But Miss Sterling wrote that movie commitments made it impossible for her to be here.

"These Hollywood people," said

the judge, "ask the protection of the courts, but they fail to appear when it doesn't suit their convenience."

"Who do they think they are? Movie people are no better than anybody else. I would issue a bench warrant, except that Miss Sterling apparently is out of the state and it couldn't be enforced."

Miss Elliott's attorney asked immediate trial "to clear her name."

The district attorney's side asked a continuance. The judge granted it, until Feb. 18, with a warning to the D. A. to "take all measures necessary to insure the appearance of the complaining witness."

As character witnesses, Miss Elliott had subpoenaed Jane Russell, Lana Turner, Joan Crawford, Victor Mature and Jimmy Durante.
