Count U.S. Strength,
Robert R. Gros Urges

ing on our strength and not just our weaknesses. "I happen to be one who believes fervently that the only way we can save this precious freedom of ours is through open debate, a free objective press and critical public scrutiny of government. I hold a deep and abiding conviction that mistakes warrant constructive criticism; that starry-eyed complacency is not unity. Constructive criticism — and let's keep it constructive and not partisan — is both a privilege and an obligation in democracy. Therefore I propose that we continue raising our voices and shouting from the housetops, pointing out mistakes so that our nation may be right and insisting on competence that our nation may be strong."

"Weak-kneed political and diplomatic leadership does not mean America is weak. Why should we quake in our boots and swallow the propaganda that Russia is invincible? We need fear only the timidity of defeatism and the unreality of appeasement."

"The question is not whether we dare risk war with Russia. Rather it is: Have we not yet learned that appeasement never means peace? I don't suggest jingoism or that we take an unrealistic tack in foreign policy. But I do advocate that it's high time we took a fresh look at the America's balance sheet, weighing not just our alleged weaknesses, but also counting our blessings and recognizing our strengths."

"Let's think about that strength of America which lies in our broad plains, in our majestic mountains and forests, in our nation's homes and churches and schools; in its plantations, farms and freely operated businesses, its virile free press, in the quality of our leadership."

"And our basic and real strength of our nation is not found just in material things — in our military might or our industrial potential, the matchless productive capacity of free enterprise, assets though these things are. That primary and greatest strength comes from America's most priceless heritage — the force of a free people. No disciplined mass, no political or moral slaves can match the magnificent strength, unity and spirit of free men."

"That's the spirit which built the U.S.A. That's the strength of liberty, giving rise to independence and creativeness. That's the spirit which is more concerned with opportunity than intoxicated with social security. Only in this climate can we rise out of our temporary confusion and disunity, our groping for leadership and purpose — and meet the challenge of survival and then move progressively forward."

"Let us be humble in our blessings; but let us take new courage and faith and confidence, as we rejoice in our might. And let us reject with all our hearts those false prophets who counsel despair and defeatism. "In God's name, we shall be the means by which the cancer of communism will be destroyed so that the dignity, decency, hope and freedom shall march forward once again."
