Louis C. Pakiser, Jr., of Tulsa, Okla., the AVC's executive director, testified that both UMT and the draft could and should operate together.

He sharply criticized as a "timid approach" a proposal that only 60.000 18-year olds be trained initially and then placed in the reserve subject to later call for active duty. The National Security Training Commission, which would superstart with 60.000 and then gradually be expanded until the training covers 800.000 youths a year. Pakiser also opposed a proposal voted by the House Armed Services Committee that the UMT trainees not be called to active duty until Congress specifically approves.

"To allow 18 year olds to return to civilian life while older men are required to remain on active duty would be wrong," Pakister said.

STANDISH, Mich. (# — A young wife whose Air Force pilot husband was sent out on more than 100 Korean combat missions due to "some mistake in the records" tried to be bravely optimistic Thursday after learning he is missing in action.

Mrs. Daniel G. Metiva's husband wrote that he had completed 101 missions, although pilots usually are sent home after 100, and was expecting to return by next month. After receiving a Defense Department telegram, she refused to think her husband is dead.

All the boys here are trying to complete their 100th mission as soon as they can so they will be able to return to the United States." Then on Sunday, came a telegram from the Defense Department. It said Lt. Metiva "has been missing since Feb. 9, while participating in Korean operations."
