South School Districts May Take Bonding Cut

Shuler wrote back: "Debt limit provision of the statute are strictly construed. While it undoubtedly was intended that school districts have a 15 per cent limit for the purpose of operating elementary and high schools, the statute certainly does not so provide."

"Under these circumstances I am rather afraid that I could not approve bonds under the higher debt limit until further action by the legislature."

Supt. Barneburg, in his letter to the districts, commented: "This may make considerable difference in the plans of the school districts named above, and we are making this information available to you at this time so that it may be considered in your plans for the future."

If a union high school district were formed, the five districts would have a total bonding capacity of \$428,901 remaining, Barneburg said. In addition each elementary district would have further bonding capacity totaling \$379,369 for use within the districts themselves. However, this could not be used for the union high school.

Elzie David Golden Passes Early Today

Elzie David Golden, 67, resident of Myrtle Creek since 1928, died early this morning. Mr. Golden was born Sept. 29, 1884, in Melrose, O. He was a carpenter, and also operated a pool hall in Myrtle Creek for five years.

Survivors, beside his widow, are a daughter, Myrtle, of Myrtle Creek; three sons, Robert, with the Army Air Corps in Washington; and Richard and Everett of Myrtle Creek; five children in the East, and a daughter, Mrs. Laura Markille of Roseburg, six sisters and four brothers, all in the East, 16 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Sunday in the chapel of Ganz Mortuary, Myrtle Creek, with the Rev. Harold Burelson, of the Myrtle Creek Methodist Church officiating. The remains will be shipped to Hesperia, Mich., for interment.

Lower Columbia River May Be Dredged Deeper

WASHINGTON — Action has been started by Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) that may lead to deepening the Lower Columbia River channel.

Angell has introduced resolutions to authorize the Army Engineers to bring earlier surveys of the river up to date. He explained, however, that the House Public Works Committee will not vote on the resolutions until an opinion has been received from the Engineers on the need for a new survey.

Committee approval is required before a new survey can be authorized.

The Oregon congressman asked that such a survey determine whether the channel should be dredged from its present 40-foot depth to 48 feet or some other level.

Douglas Forest Protective Assn. Has Costly Year

All officers were reelected at the annual meeting of the Douglas Forest Protective Association held Thursday in the Hotel Umpqua. The officers are R. R. Van Orden, president; H. O. Fargeter, secretary treasurer; Henry Champeau, vice-president; and Fred Southwick, district warden.

The directors for 1952 include Frank Heath, Tom Mehl Jr., Kenneth Ford, J. D. McCann, Clyde Martin, Charles Preppernau, Eugene R. Walsh, Van Orden and Champeau.

The secretary's report shows that 1951 was the costliest in the history of the Association. According to the U. S. Weather Bureau, Douglas County experienced the driest season in 27 years.

The directors set up a program covering the payment of all outstanding claims against the Association, which are to be liquidated within a two-year period. This consists of Douglas County's share of one-third of the cost of the Vincent Creek fire. The total cost of fighting this fire was \$450,000, leaving \$150,000 as the Association's portion.

Cost of the Hubbard Creek and other fires in the county is estimated at \$150,000. This indebtedness will be paid by the various timber companies through additional assessments to be levied for the next two years. It is expected that considerable recovery will be made on all operators fires by the State Forester's office through the attorney general, who will prosecute all claims where fires were started through the negligence of the operator.
