Mrs. Bernard Howser, Leader Association chairman, conducted the meeting. The skating party of the girls will be Sunday, Feb. 17, at 2 p.m., at the Roletta Rink with Mrs. James Conn as chairman in charge. The all-city sing will be March 1, the time and place to be announced later. R. Lloyd Riffe will be in charge.

Miss Armstrong spoke on the Camp Fire "birthday project" and Bluebirds. While the birthday project is being conducted throughout the year, it will be highlighted in March with national Camp Fire Week.

On Bluebirds, Miss Armstrong spoke of their work in connection with Junior Red Cross and the part they can play in caring for children in connection with Civil Defense in event of a disaster.

Miss Armstrong, with one other executive, serves the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, which have the largest Camp Fire membership of any council in the nation, total of 27 out of 50 national council members are from the Northwest district. One of these is Mrs. James Conn, elected recently at Seattle.

Leroy Inman, New-Review city editor, briefed the group on what constitutes news from Camp Fire groups and other organizations. He stressed the importance of timeliness in reporting the activities of the individual groups, as well as that of the Camp Fire Council, and invited questions from a yone associated with the organization to improve the quality of the news reports.

Death Decline Noted
In Traffic Accidents

Twenty persons died in Oregon traffic accidents last month to continue a death decline noted in December, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported today.

The January toll, still regarded as tentative pending possible receipt of delayed death reports, marks a favorable reduction from the 28 fatalities recorded in January a year ago. December deaths totalled 25, as compared with 37 in December of 1950.

Newberry warned, however, that the decline may be short-lived. Reports for the first 10 days of February list 12 dead in traffic accidents throughout the state, including four young people killed in one Linn county accident last week. If the early February killing pace continues, the secretary pointed out, the January reduction will be wiped out.

Preliminary studies of all 1951 mishaps, Newberry said, again show a violation of a traffic law as a principal factor in close to 90 per cent.

"Most accidents causing violations stem from momentary inattention or carelessness rather than deliberate wrong-doing," Newberry said. "But the end result is the same."

He said to many drivers and pedestrians still fail to comprehend that habitual obedience to traffic laws is essential to personal safety.
