Orchestra Given Good Reception In Concert Debut

Monday's public debut of the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra was enthusiastically applauded Monday night by a crowd at the Junior High School Auditorium—and special laurels went to Martha Jane Plimpton, piano soloist. Conductor Wendell Johnson and the orchestra personnel took several curtain calls.

The formally dressed orchestra—newly formed under the sponsorship of the Roseburg Kiwanis Club—offered a varied program. Numbers ranged from the delicate "Suite for Strings," by Milkey, to the colorful nationalistic composition by Grieg, "Piano Concerto in A Minor."

Mrs. Plimpton played the concerto in A Minor and her polished performance was well-received by the audience.

Another top-notch solo performance was that of Martha Mulkey, concertmistress, who presented the intermezzo and serenade from "Hassan" by Delius.

Following intermission, the orchestra's final two numbers were Mikey's "Suite for Strings," and "Symphony in C Major," by Haydn.

The orchestra, which calls itself "strictly an amateur group, composed of your friends and neighbors," plans two additional concerts for this season. The next will include Virginia Young, talented Roseburg pianist and teacher, in a presentation of the entire Schumann piano concerto.

A later concert will combine the Roseburg and University of Oregon orchestras, according to present plans.

Douglas County's Road Policy Told By Beckley

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augurate a permanent road oiling project in the county.

But he added that the roads must be in condition for the application of oil if the results are to be beneficial.

In fairness to each district, the oiling program will be limited to a certain mileage in each area, Beckley said.

The commissioner said the county court had recently obtained a road study conducted by the Forest service recently that would aid in the county's road construction program.

Beckley then turned his attention briefly to the road controversy that is broiling in the Sutherlin-Oakland district.

He said that if Sutherlin is concerned primarily with an access road, neither of the routes proposed would become road sites.

County engineers, he explained, have surveyed a route that would have less adverse grade than either of those now being considered, but it would serve only two or three people.

"In the building of roads, the county as a whole should be considered," the commissioner stated.

J. W. Grivett Winner Of Dairy Show Honors

A Roseburg man, John W. Grivett, is listed as winner of three gold certificate awards in milk and cream class in the annual dairy products judging announced Saturday by Dr. G. H. Wilster, professor of dairy manufacturing at Oregon State College.

Grivett, superintendent of the milk department at Umpqua Dairy Products plant, won the awards in Grade A homogenized milk; Grade A, half and half, 10 percent milk, and Grade A pasteurized whipping cream.

The judging was held before the opening of the 41st annual meeting of the Oregon Dairy Manufacturing association last week. Fifty-nine milk and cream entries were received for this contest, conducted for the first time this year. A record high of 171 entries were received in the butter, ice cream, cheese and milk contests, Dr. Wilster said.

27,655 X-Rays Taken In County During Survey

During the five weeks the mobile X-ray units were operative in Douglas County, 27,655 persons were X-rayed.

That is the final figure released by the County Health Department.

The survey ended Feb. 16, but retake units will continue in operation until March 8. Two weeks from that date the number of tubercular cases detected will be tabulated.

The number X-rayed represents 68.26 per cent of the 40,500 persons 15 years of age and older living in the county.

Mrs. Bertha Parkhurst, education consultant from the State Board of Health who supervised the campaign, said the percentage was higher than that recorded in the Willamette Valley.

And there, she said the conditions were ideal, which indicates that organization in this area was "very good."

Miss Parkhurst praised the communities highly for their co-operation during the survey.

"The communities should have pride in the way in which they worked as one," she said.

Power companies also received praise for their hookup services and electrical current.
