Moscow's Reply To American Boy Draws 2nd Note

BALTIMORE — What do the Russians think of the Korean War and what may be prolonging negotiations at Panmunjom?

Those are two of the questions Gene Klupt, 17-year old Baltimore high school boy, is asking in his second letter to Radio Moscow.

Klupt got a reply to his first letter criticizing a Radio Moscow news broadcast. He wasn't sure whether he would continue the correspondence but he said he was swamped with telephone calls from as far away as Los Angeles, urging him to reply.

The letter he got from Moscow said most Americans, not among the top men, had trouble getting enough food to keep body and soul together.

That was the same line that Moscow had broadcast when Gene heard the program and it prompted him to write the query.

Gene questions the use of the phrase "body and soul" in letter No. 2.

"I have always been led to believe that religion is not carried on or believed in Russia. If this is so, why do you mention the word 'soul'?" Gene asks.

"In just a few months," letter No. 2 continues, "we will have elections here... for President, senators and congressmen, etc. Please explain how your system works

and how long these men hold their offices."

Gene, who said he was "anxiously awaiting your reply," directed the second letter to L. Petrov, Radio Moscow, Moscow, USSR. Petrov replied to the first message.

Kills Himself Because Denied Visa To U.S.

SANTIAGO, Chile — An Estonian artist leaped to death from the seventh floor of the U.S. embassy after throwing two homemade bombs to "blow the whole place up" because he was repeatedly refused a visa to visit his wife in Florida.

The exploding bombs only burned a rug and a sofa.

Consular officials said the Estonian, 43-year old Richard D. Pallas, returned to the embassy Monday afternoon with the bombs after a visa to enter the United States was again denied during the morning.

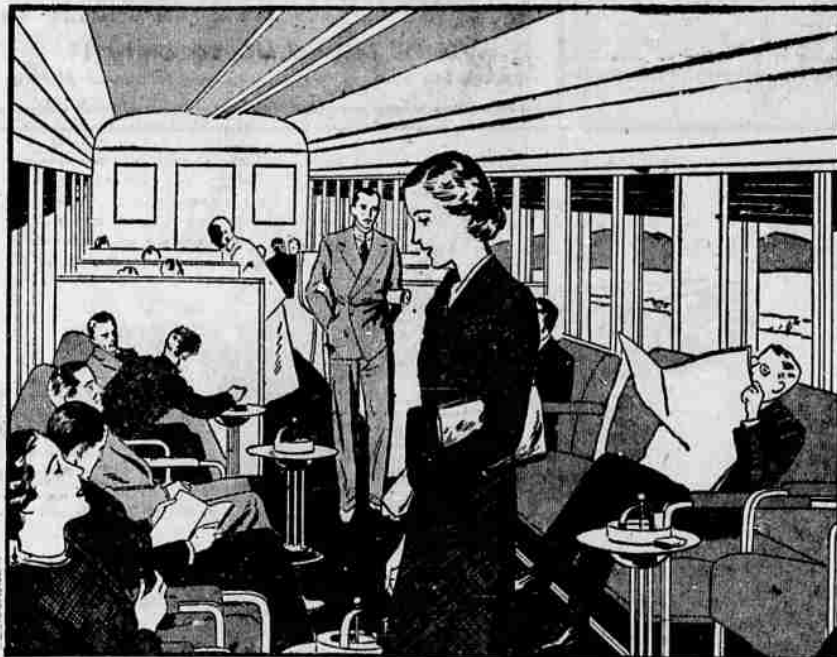
An embassy spokesman said the visa was refused Pallas because consular officials "thought he had been deported from the United States."
