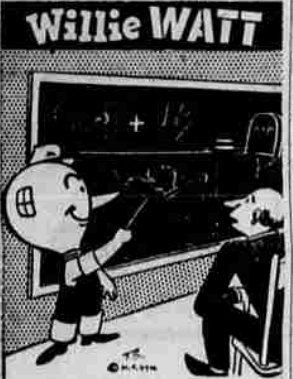
Underwater Blasts Set For Lake Pend Oreille

SPOKANE — The Navy apparently intends to conduct underwater explosion tests on Lake Pend Oreille in Northern Idaho despite objections from Spokane city officials and sportsmen.

Willard Taft, Spokane utilities commissioner, said after a two-hour session with a Navy spokesman Thursday, that he understands the Navy is ready to go ahead.

Capt. A. G. Mumma, Navy demolition expert told the group the planned TNT tests would have no harmful effect on the Spokane water supply nor the fishing at the lake.

"But there is still an element of risk, an element of doubt," Taft said, referring to fear that the blasts might damage underground passages from Pend Oreille.

State Highway Board Sells Batch Of Bonds

PORTLAND — The Oregon State Highway Commission Tuesday sold 15 million dollars worth of bonds to a banking group at an effective interest rate of 1.634 per cent.

A similar amount of bonds, part of the 40 million dollar program authorized by the last legislature, sold last fall at 1.61 per cent.

The successful bidder Tuesday was Bankers Trust Company and the National City Bank of New York and a group of associates. Among the associated were three with local connection: The United States National Bank of Portland, Blythe & Co., and Dean Witter & Co. Five other groups sought the bonds.

Negative Vote On Chinese May Be Reversed

SAN FRANCISCO — The South San Francisco City Council Monday night unanimously approved a resolution condemning the all-white Southwood tract residents who voted against admitting a Chinese family.

Public and press reaction became nearly worldwide. Some residents of the South San Francisco tract started a move to reverse the 174-28 ballot by which Sing Sheng, his wife and 2 year old son were voted out.

Sheng started it by inviting a "Democratic ballot" on his admission to the tract, where he'd made a \$2,950 payment on a \$12,000 home.

He is an airline mechanic and former Chinese Nationalist army officer.

O. M. Brown, spokesman for a Southwood group seeking reversal of the Saturday vote declared: "A lot of us are still Christians who believe in God and are glad to have any honorable man living among us."

Sheng, 25, said he had received offers of 30 homes in the Bay area, Oregon, Wichita, Kansas, and Indiana. But he wanted to live in South San Francisco near his job.

Comment From Hong Kong

In Hong Kong, China, the Hong Kong Standard said Sheng was the victim of his "enduring faith in all the Democratic balderdash on which the world has of late been fed."

The Standard, owned by Chinese millionaire Aw Boon Haw, is normally pro-American and anti-Communist.

The paper commented that Sing Sheng "is as much to blame as his would-be neighbors" when he was voted out last Saturday in an election he himself proposed.

"The ideals of Democracy, like the ideals of Christianity, are to be nurtured, not be lightly experimented with," the newspaper said. "In spite of the miracles one reads in the Bible, no one is supposed to try to work miracles in every day life."

Morse Defends Chiefs Of Staff As Slap At Taft

DALLAS, Tex. — Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.) said Sunday those who want all-out war in Asia are being unduly critical of the joint chiefs of staff.

Morse defended the joint chiefs in a speech before the United Jewish Appeal regional conference here. He said the joint chiefs were doing what they could to absorb the first shocks of all out war, when and if they come.

Morse's comments could be interpreted as critical of Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio). Taft, a candidate for Republican nomination to the presidency, criticized the joint chiefs while he was in the Pacific Northwest last week. He said they had failed to meet commitments.

Morse told his audience that "unless we help Europe to defend itself and to raise its standards of living, its people will be an easy prey of Communism. We cannot walk out of Europe either militarily or economically and have allies," he said.

"The European people are simply not going to buy the so-called perimeter defense theory of the new isolationism in America. According to this theory, all we need to do is surround our friends abroad with American Navy and air bases—and then, if Russia attacks them, we would liberate them by pulverizing their cities."

Morse said Gen. Eisenhower was his choice for President.

NEW HARDBOARD MILL

PORTLAND — Another hardboard mill now is in production in Oregon, a 2 1/2 million-dollar plant of the Oregon Lumber Company at Dee in Hood River County.

President A. C. Lighthall Jr. said the plant was producing sheets in quarter-inch thickness from slab waste.

West Germany Denied Equal NATO Rights

LONDON — The Big Three foreign ministers met with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer Monday to tell him that West Germany so far can share in Atlantic Pact planning and strategy only as a member of the European Army, not as a full member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The British, French and American diplomats joined Adenauer at Britain's Foreign Office to tell him their answer to the West German Parliament's demand for an equal voice in NATO in exchange for German troops for Western Defense.

France was reported to have insisted on a distinction in the powers of a proposed four-power appeals tribunal to pardon or parole convicted German war criminals.

Cong. Doughton, 88, Not To Seek Re-Election

WASHINGTON — Chairman Robert L. Doughton, D-N.C., of the House Ways and Means Committee announced Friday he plans to retire from Congress at the end of his present term.

After making the announcement, the 88-year old 21 term veteran told reporters he sees no indication that Congress will consider another general tax increase bill this year.

The French said a pardon would infer the removal of guilt.

The four ministers also were reported to have talked about Germany's financial contribution to European defense.

The temporary council committee of NATO, headed by W. Averell Harriman, sent a report to Adenauer Sunday estimating Germany's ability to pay 11 1/4 billion marks, or \$2,700,000,000.

The Bonn Republic previously had set nine billion marks as the best it could do.

France May Get New U.S. Aid To Battle Reds

WASHINGTON — The United States is considering giving special new aid to help France carry on the fight against a Communist conquest of Indochina.

State Department officials believe that additional assistance—in the form of either dollars or increased military supplies to Indochina—would be sufficient, provided the Chinese Communists do not intervene in the Indochina war as they did in Korea.

Should the Chinese Reds launch a major assault there, however, it would pose an issue of aid of a different sort—whether the United States and other United Nations would send in troops to help the French and native defense forces or strike directly at Communist China itself.

What the American government would do in that event is still undecided.

Heavy Burden On France

The burden of financial assistance has arisen at this time because American studies of France's continuing economic crises have convinced officials here that maintenance of the present forces in Indochina is a heavy drain on the French economy and an important factor in France's long range ability to build up military strength in Europe.

The French parliament has voted 400 billion francs—about \$100,000,000—for the Indochina war this year.

This is expected to be from one-third to one-fourth of France's total military budget, the European section of which has yet to be fixed.

If additional American aid to ease France's Indochina burden is agreed upon, the present tentative planning here is to begin it in fiscal 1953 which starts July 1.

President Truman has estimated the foreign aid outlay next fiscal year will total 10 1/2 billion dollars for all purposes but whether Congress will grant this sum is yet to be determined.

Negotiators In Korea Agree On Another Item

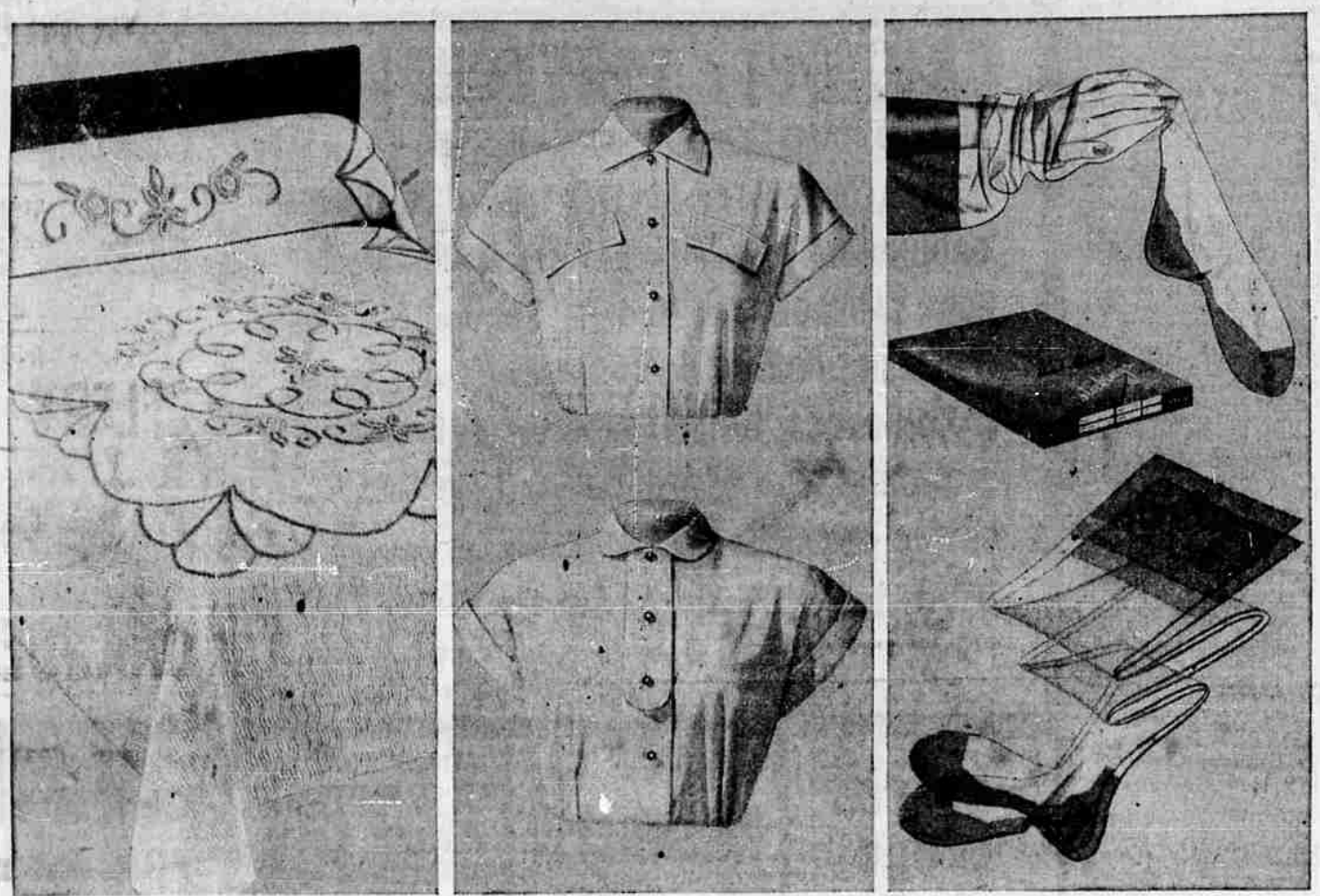
MUNSAN, Korea — Negotiators agreed Tuesday on the final clause of a Korean armistice, but two major hurdles still blocked a truce settlement.

The agreement: To recommend that belligerent governments hold a high level political conference within 80 days after an armistice to consider "withdrawal of all foreign forces from Korea, the peaceful settlement of the Korean question, etc."

SEOUL, Korea — U.S. Sabre jet pilots shot down three Red jet fighter planes in two roaring air fights over Northwest Korea Tuesday.

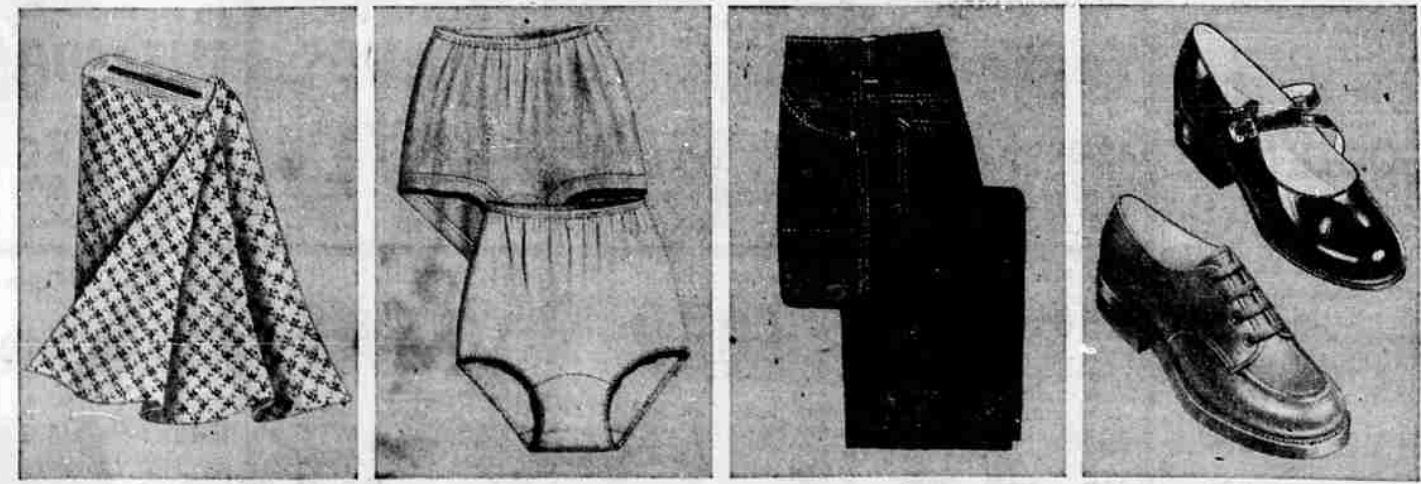
Other Allied jet fliers reported they destroyed four locomotives on the Communists' North Korean supply network.
