Acheson Urges Allies To Boost Armed Power

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — A grave-faced Dean Acheson told the Atlantic Allies, opening their ninth council session Wednesday: "We must take actions that will strain all of us to the utmost."

"It is a task for governments and for peoples," the U.S. Secretary of State said. "We must develop the concrete military strength which alone can insure our people against the destruction and suffering of another war."

Two new members, Greece and Turkey, joined the 12 Western Allies in a meeting of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization council — composed of foreign, defense and finance ministers.

Portuguese Foreign Minister Paulo Cunha, in the role of host, broke into the usual welcoming pleasantries with a plea for the admission of Spain to the alliance. He blasted Spain's exclusion as

a strategic absurdity, and said defense of the Iberian Peninsula was indivisible.

Goal Not In Sight — Acheson's words came shortly after reliable reports said North Atlantic Treaty Organization economic experts had reported that 1954 will fall 12 per cent short of realization.

But he declared the creation of the European Defense Community, the diplomatic name for a European army uniting Germans and French with the soldiers of four other nations, "has been brought to a point where the approval of this council for its form and authority can be obtained."

The planners look for the Germans to provide 12 divisions in this force.

Acheson was fresh from a meeting in London with British and French foreign ministers and West

German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer which apparently paved the way for West German participation in the supra-national army.

Parents, Two Children Die In Tenement Fire

SOMERVILLE, Mass. (AP) — A family of four—the parents and two children they apparently tried to save—perished Thursday night in a fire that damaged four tenement buildings.

The body of Anthony Carcaro, 52, was found with that of his daughter, Jeanette, 2 1/2, clutched in his arms.

Mrs. Eva Carcaro, 35, was found dead near the body of a son, Richard, 5.

Some 30 persons, many of them children in nightclothes, were made homeless by the general alarm fire in sub-freezing temperatures.

Boys On Their Own Get Stuck In Elevator

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The good old days and the simple life are gone forever, it seems.

Look at the case of two school-boys who decided Thursday no more school for them. Time to get out in the world and make a living.

Attendants at the Federal Building in downtown Philadelphia rescued them from an elevator stalled between floors after hours Thursday night.

Asked how come, they explained they saw no operator on duty and thought the elevator was self-operating. Pulled the wrong levers, they guessed, and that's how they got stuck.

But what were they doing in the Federal Building?

The older one, age 13, solemnly replied: "Well, to get jobs we have to get our Social Security cards."

Attack On Meat Control Kept Up

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Western States Meat Packers Association continued hammering Friday against the government's price and slaughter control program.

"High production is the real answer to inflation," E. Floyd Forbes, San Francisco, the Association's president, told the final day's session of its annual convention. "But if we are to achieve full production, the unrealistic, arbitrary, confusing and unsound price control system must be abolished."

Forbes said the association will inaugurate a campaign to tell the public that Western meat is as good as any produced elsewhere.

"This is necessary because Midwestern packers have surpassed us in advertising and promotional campaigns featuring 'Eastern beef' and 'Eastern corn-fed pork,'" he said.

He added that 300 commercial packing plants in the nine Western

states represented by the Association slaughtered 15 per cent of all the cattle killed by commercial establishments in the country in 1951.
