Mix together: 2 1/2 cups sifted Crown Flour 1/4 cup cold shortening 1/4 teaspoon salt

Cut in: 1/4 cup cold shortening

Put top crust on pie. Place in very hot oven (450°F) for 15 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate (350°F) and bake about 30 minutes.
