Large Crowd Is On Hand For Contests

Riverside, Rose Heavy Teams, Rose, Benson Peewees Enter Finals

A near capacity house at the Roseburg High School gym Friday night saw everything from pondorous route to paper-thin victories in the Grade School annual basketball and volleyball tournament.

The Riverside and Rose Heavies battled through the first round and into the finals, and the Rose and Benson Pee Wees notched initial victories to clinch their final berths.

The Rose girls' volleyball team defeated Benson, 36-17, to enter the finals against defending champion Fullerton.

This means exactly half the final teams are from Rose School. It puts that school in a possible position of completely sweeping the tournament when play gets underway at 6:00.

In the Pee Wee basketball division, Benson slaughtered Riverside, 23-0, in an amazing white-wash game. Rose won its game with a score of 8-3, victory over Fullerton. The Riverside Heavies fared better as they posted Fullerton, 24-9. Rose capped the evening with the master thriller, a squeaking 24-22, decision over Benson.

Athletic Director Cee Sherwood classified the Rose-Benson Heavy game as one of the best in the history of the tournament. After Rose took a formidable lead, Benson surged back in the third quarter and tied the score at 16-16 in the final canto. The score was again tied at 18-18 and 20-20 before Rose went ahead, 24-20, in the waning minutes.

Games tonight start with the consolation playoffs at 6:00 when the Riverside Pee Wees meet Fullerton. Following, the Fullerton Heavies meet Benson. Then, the girls' volleyball championship will be decided before the basketball finals.

The Benson-Rose Pee Wee championship game precedes the last game of the evening between the Riverside and Rose Heavies.

The Myrtle Creek Vikings invaded Illinois Valley Friday night with a championship gleam in their eye and before the night was over the Vikings knew they were JDJ championship material.

The Vikings scored more points than in any game over a two year period in bouncing the hosts, 71-45. The win gave the Douglas County squad a co-championship with Crater High of Central Point.

With Center Jerry Jones leading the attack in the first quarter, the Vikings boomed off to a 20-8 lead. They hit a lull in the second quarter and the Cougars found their breath long enough to whittle the lead to its narrowest margin at halftime, 27-26.

During the halftime rest, Coach Bob Abrahamson fashioned a new strategy to stop the big Illinois Valley center, who had scored 12 points in the first half. He was blanked in the third quarter and the Vikings were on top, 47-30. By this time, Pinky Anderson was in record-breaking form as he poured in 17 of his 21 points in the last half.

Roseburg Grapplers Place Eight For State Tourney At Corvallis Next Weekend

Eight Roseburg High School grapplers battled to state tournament wrestling berths at the sub-district 3 matches at Grants Pass Friday.

This is the most men a Roseburg team has ever placed in the state tourney. Last year the Indians had six. The champion and runner-up in each weight division is given the nod from each sub-district. Grants Pass, the sub-district team champs, placed 10 and Medford collected 6 places for the state tournament at Corvallis Feb. 29 and Mar. 1. The team scores were just as close. Grants Pass had 21 points, Roseburg, 16 and Medford, 13.

The Indians won four sub-district championships and four runner-up spots. Winners in their divisions were: Bob Moore in the 98-pound class; Dave Parkhurst in the 130-pound class; Ron Hicks in the 157-pound class and Tom Findlay in the 178-pound class. Runnersup were: Bob Kennedy in 98-pound, Mike Keeney in 138-pound, Bob Thomas in the 141-pound and Jerry Jones in 148-pound.

Only Findlay, Jones and Keeney are seniors. Moore and Thomas are freshmen, Parkhurst and Kennedy are sophomores and Hicks is a junior. By winning matches or appearing in them, Wayne Wood, Bob Thomas, Bob Moore, Ron Nygaard and Jack Palm won their letters.
