once the material is available for their use, he said.

Robinson said that most of the work on the Centennial will be done by local people. His part will be to direct writing and the presentation of the pageant. He expects to be in Roseburg on weekends at intervals until the middle of June. Then he will take up residence here and remain until the celebration has been completed.

Complimenting the committee on its early start on the Centennial preparations, Robinson said he is encouraged by the enthusiasm shown both by local and outside sources. He said the committee has had a rather rough time of it during the early months, but these problems should smooth out, and since the affair will be in late summer, there should be ample time to work out the details.

Directing pageants is nothing new to Robinson. He has handled the Eugene Trail pageants since 1937 and produced centennial programs at Klamath Falls and Salem. He has been very active with the University and Little Theater groups in Eugene. He is a member of the executive board of the American Educational Theater Association.

Accompanying Robinson here on his last visit was Howard Ramsey, lighting technician. With Centennial Chairman Lowell Rhoden, they inspected the Fairgrounds facilities where the pageant will take place.

NURSES PLAN MEETING

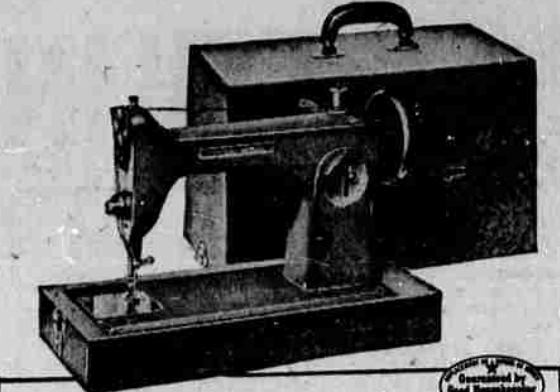

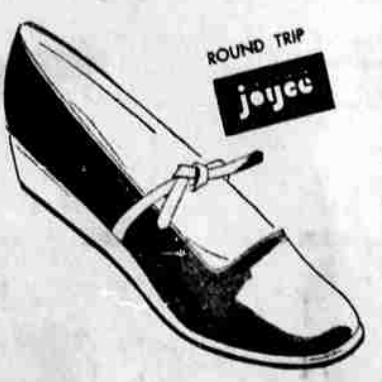
