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## Volunteers Get Praise For Part In X-Ray Survey

The success of the recent chest X-ray survey in Douglas County can be attributed to volunteer cooperation.

That is the consensus of the Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health Association, the Douglas County Health Department and Ira Byrd, county chairman.

During the five-week campaign, 1212 persons volunteered their services, statistics reveal. To operate a unit for one day 12 volunteers were required.

There were 124 clerks working four-hour shifts, and 248 hosts and hostesses working two-hour stints. In Roseburg, 15 captains had 145 canvassers covering the area.

The proportion for the county canvassers ran approximately the same except in sparsely populated areas, where fewer canvassers covered more territory.

When illness or inability prevented workers from following the schedule, many persons worked double shifts.

The unit was operative in the county 101 days, or 813 hours. In Roseburg they were in operation 62 days or 496 hours.

A retake unit has been set up at the court house and will remain there until March 8. Arrangements have been made for persons living in Azalea and Glendale to have additional X-rays taken in Grants Pass.

County service groups were also praised for the part they played in making the survey a success.

Secret Service Picture Shown C Of C Members

The manner in which plates for counterfeit money are manufactured was explained, and the differences in the false and genuine bills was demonstrated.

## Dixie Foes Of Truman Back Senator Russell

representatives paved the way for another possible break with the national party. It voted without dissent for all political parties to nominate anyone they wish as the state organization's choice for President and Vice President.

Bell said Southern Democrats feel the Dixie revolt would collapse if almost any candidate other than Truman were nominated.

Even so, some of them fear Tennessee's Senator Estes Kefauver may split the Southern vote. Many leaders in the South remain cool toward Kefauver's candidacy.

The Tennessee senator continued his busy campaigning, going into the President's home state of Missouri. In St. Louis he said without naming names Monday that "the head of a government... has a clear responsibility... to clean up any corrupt or dishonest act as quickly as it springs up."

Another Democratic presidential Kefauver invades Missouri.

Moody, Senator Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma, won unanimous endorsement of his state's Democratic Central Committee. Kerr has said he will be a candidate only if Truman does not run.

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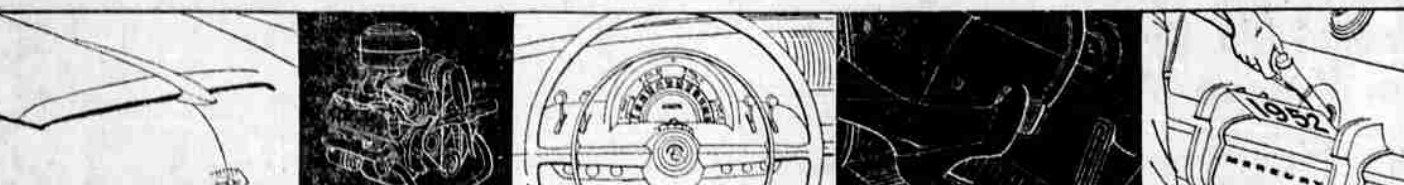
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
