County Clerk Agee Announces Precinct Split

The Civil Bend voting precinct has been split into two precincts, according to Roy Agee, county clerk. This was necessary due to the large increase in population of the three communities comprising the precinct—Winston, Dillard and Brockway. Civil Bend will continue to handle votes cast from Winston and Brockway, while Dillard will form a precinct all its own. The South Umpqua will form the main boundary line. At the bend of the river, the boundary will run due west. All residents along highway 42, and its branch roads, will be considered in the original Civil Bend precinct, polling place for which will probably remain in Winston as in previous years, while residents of Dillard and Kent Creek will form the new precinct.

In past years, the turn-out has been heavy for primary and general elections. In the last two years, the turn-out has been less than in the past, and it is to be hoped that the new precincts will be able to maintain the high standard of the old precinct.
