Delinquency Row:

Irresponsible Parents Setting Bad Examples One Of Principal Causes

(This is the second in a series of three articles dealing with the problem of juvenile delinquency in the county.)

"Get the hell out of this house and don't come back 'till I tell you!"

That approximates what a father said one night to his young

daughter, she tearfully told Judge Carl C. Hill in juvenile court. There were many times the father didn't want her in the house, she explained. This usually happened when he was entertaining a group of his cronies at a drinking party.

Perhaps there should be a Delinquency Row for parents. Parental delinquency has been brought out many times as a factor in causing juvenile delinquency.

The girl mentioned had been in trouble many times. She came to the attention of police at the age of 13 as a runaway. Even before that, police learned, she had been in minor escapades.

When she was 15 she was arrested for illegal possession of intoxicating liquor and a year later she ran away with a teen-age group with the intention of getting married. Now, at 17, she is on probation.

The girl is from a large family. Her mother found it necessary to work nights to support the family—thus leaving the children without parental supervision during such periods.

Causes Summed Up
Summing up the causes of juvenile delinquency, District Attorney Robert G. Davis lists three main factors: Drinking, driving and home environment.

"I can't think of a single juvenile case, outside of mental deficiency, where the basic cause couldn't be traced to one of those three things," Davis said.

Under home environment Davis said he means either neglectful or over-indulgent parents.

Judge Hill, looking back over the records of juvenile proceed-

ings, said he believed 90 per cent of the youngsters coming from poor home environment. One of the worst parental offenses, he said, is the constant bickering and ill will that the fathers and mothers exhibit before their children.

And many parents—lots of them fine upstanding families—neglect their children simply by not paying any attention to them. So many parents are too busy with other things. But there's more to being a parent than just clothing and housing their children, officials agree.

It's a matter of one thing leading to another, so far as automobiles are concerned, Davis commented.

Automobile Is Factor

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of associates, press, radio and movies, and the "trend of the times" all contribute to the rising delinquency rate.

"Adult thinking is not what it was before, and this is very rapidly transmitted to the youngsters," he said.

"I think there is an indifference to violations of the law that we didn't use to have—a complacency among the youngsters regarding the law."

And the rapid pace of modern times has something to do with it, Judge Hill said.

"We used to walk or ride a horse and be satisfied and enjoyed it. But now we've got to have a car that will go 60 or 100 miles an hour," he explained.

Some students at high school may have a feeling of inferiority—particularly those from outlying districts, Judge Hill finds in handling juvenile cases. Some don't feel like part of the "gang" or central high school group. They think of themselves more as "visitors."

Joe Haystead, state patrolman who handles considerable juvenile work for that department, also noted that the moral standards of the parents are lower than they used to be, and children, impressionable, naturally drift to lower standards.

Another factor, Haystead said, may be church and Sunday School training.

"Parents never 'take' their

youngsters to church," he said. "They 'send' them. Many of the juvenile delinquents I've encountered never go to church."

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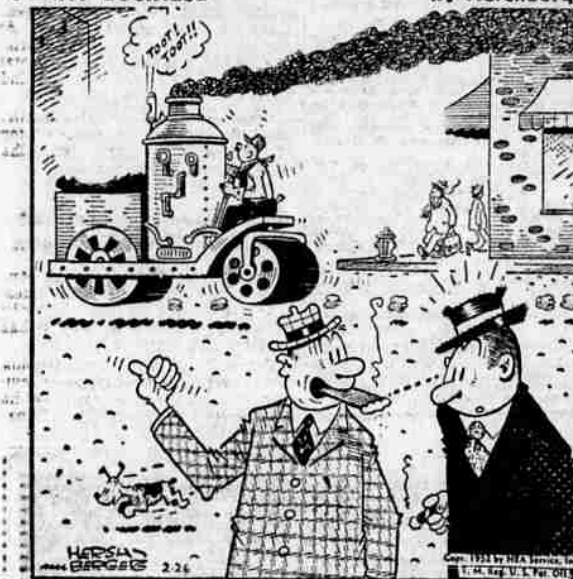
