OLYMPIA (U. M.) — Gov. Langil said Tuesday that no new evidence was presented at the conference with Irvin Goodman, attorney for Utah and Turman Wilson, Monday.

Goodman told reporters after the meeting that he had given the governor the names of persons who might be "suspects" in the kidnapping murder of JoAnn Dewey at Vancouver, Wash., two years ago.

The Wilson brothers are under a death sentence for the crime.

Earlier Monday Gov. Langil conferred with the Rev. and Mrs. Frank E. Morgan who said they were spiritual advisors to the Wilson brothers.

LOCUST, N. J. (U. M.) — A 39-year-old mother whose four-year-old son tumbled into an 18-foot well Monday jumped in to rescue him and went through a half-hour ordeal until help came.

Mrs. Edith Massell said she spent the time clutching her son to keep him afloat in the eight-foot deep water while reciting nursery rhymes. She hung on to a small pipe on the side of the well.
