

Russian Menace To Alaska Cited

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Dorn (D-S.C.) believes that Russia has enough large air bases and heavy troops to enable them to land 100,000 troops on Kiska in the Aleutian Islands.

In a House speech Tuesday, Dorn said he was told while in Alaska last year that 20 Russian planes were seen in one formation in sight of U.S. Territory in Alaska.

If Russia seized one airfield in Alaska, he said, Minneapolis, Chicago, Detroit and the industrial Midwest would immediately be open to atomic attack by the Reds.

The closest common boundary between Russia and the United States, he said, is in the Bering Sea off the coast of Alaska, and "we must make Alaska impregnable to attack."

Dorn said a Soviet attack on Alaska would immediately require the rushing of large numbers of United States troops and most of our Air Force to that territory, "and you would lose Europe and the Far East simultaneously."

He said there is no doubt in his mind that if Japan could land 5,000 men on Kiska, as it did in the last war, Russia could land 100,000.

The U. S. Marines reported that no patrol employing dogs was ambushed in the Pacific war.

A-Bomb Spies Plan New Move To Dodge Death

NEW YORK (AP) — Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, husband and wife sentenced to die for giving Russia atomic secrets, looked to the U.S. Supreme Court Tuesday to save them from the electric chair.

The Rosenbergs, first Americans ever doomed for espionage outside a military courtroom, planned to appeal to the nation's highest tribunal after a U.S. Court of Appeals upheld unanimously Monday their espionage convictions and death sentences.

Defense Atty. Emanuel H. Block said he "definitely" would take the case to the Supreme Court.

If the Supreme Court rules against the Rosenbergs, only a commutation of their sentence by the President could keep them from dying in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison.

Rosenberg, an electrical engineer who will be 34 in May, and his 36-year old wife were convicted of ferreting out wartime American secrets for the same Russian-bosomed spy ring that included imprisoned British scientist Klaus Fuchs.

McKay, 19, and Sturm, 20, killed Shasta County Under Sheriff Earl Sholes and Deputy Sheriff Dan Heryford on May 25, 1950, at Gibson, about 40 miles north of Redding.

The officers were returning the two from Seattle, where they had been arrested after fleeing from a California Youth Authority camp in a stolen automobile.

Troublesome Pain

The two were convicted of first degree murder and sentenced to death in Redding last year. Their appeal from the death sentence gave them a retrial and change of venue from Shasta to Tehama County.

Tehama County Sheriff Wayne Kranig said that during the time Sturm and McKay have been in jail here they have been continual trouble makers and that a pocket knife, a three foot length of log chain, an iron bar and a heavy piece of pipe have all been found secreted in their cell.

RED BLUFF, Calif. (AP) — James McKay and Robert Sturm were convicted Friday of first degree murder of two Shasta County sheriff's officers. The jury recommended life sentences.

Jury Foreman John Swetka read the verdict shortly after midnight. He said the "jury hopes that their life sentences will be for the natural life of the defendants."

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Taft Confident Gen. MacArthur Will Back Him

Senator Taft of Ohio has told colleagues he is confident Gen. Douglas MacArthur will give him solid support for the Republican presidential nomination when the chips are down at the Chicago convention.

Taft would not comment, but friends say he isn't worried about reports MacArthur might be thinking of himself as a possible nominee if a deadlock develops between Taft and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Evidence of Taft's confidence in MacArthur was seen Sunday when he said on a television program he favored the general addressing the convention. If he does Taft added, he probably would be the keynote speaker.

But he sidestepped a direct answer to whether he plans to name MacArthur head of the joint chiefs of staff if elected. He said he hasn't been elected yet, and was not announcing any appointments.

Taft's supporters regard as significant that MacArthur did not deny News-Week magazine's article last week that he was a Taft backer.

Senator Duff (R-Pa.), an ardent Eisenhower man, said in a radio interview... that if any one in the world can win a presidential nomination without campaigning for it, the general can.

Eisenhower has said he would accept the nomination, but will not campaign for it.

Duff said he feels the general can override party regulars to win the nomination, and then go on to "crack the solid South" in November.

But the nation's news price boss, former Gov. Ellis Arnall of Georgia, said in another radio interview he didn't believe any Republican—not even Eisenhower—could carry a single Southern state in the election.

Greyhound Lines, Union Resume Wage Parley

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Wage talks were to resume here Monday between Pacific Greyhound Lines and the AFL Motor Coach Employees union, representing 3,500 workers in seven western states.

The union also plans to tally a system-wide strike vote. Pacific Greyhound's contract expires next Monday midnight.

The union is seeking a pay raise and a five-day, 40-hour work week for drivers and station employees in California, Oregon, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico and portions of Utah and Texas.

It proposes to boost drivers' mileage rates from \$7.24 to \$8.50 per 100 miles and increase the hourly rate for short run drivers from \$1.64 to \$2.04.

Greyhound has offered a four per cent wage increase and an escalator clause tying wages to the government's cost of living index.

TV Casts, Broadcasts Under Ban In House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Speaker Rayburn Monday banned telecasts or broadcasts of House committee sessions.
