Houbregs, Wegner Snare Northern Division Honors

Bob Houbregs of the Northern Division Champion Washington Huskies continues to lead the Division in total scoring but marksman honors now belong to Oregon Guard Ken Wegner.

Statistics released by the Pacific Coast Conference commissioner's office Wednesday showed Wegner has dropped 21 of 45 floor shots in 12 league games this season for 46.7 per cent, equalling the Division's free throw standard set by LaDon Henson of Washington in 1951.

The league office reported Houbregs' mark is 45.7 per cent. He has combined 80 field goals in 175

attempts with 59 free throws for 219 points.

Both players will have a chance to better the marks this week-end. Houbregs when Washington plays Washington State Friday and Saturday and Wegner against Oregon State the same days. The games end the regular season schedule.

Other Records Listed

Other Northern Division records which could be topped include: Most free throws—77, set by Jack Nichols of Washington in 1948. The Huskies' Frank Gulanowsky now has 68 and Eric Robert of WSC 71.

Best free throw percentage—83.9, set by Mel Krause, Oregon, 1951. Danny Johnston, Oregon State, is hitting 83.3.

Most rebounds—183 set by Bob Peterson, Oregon, in 1951. He has 172 in 12 games this year.

Assists—Ken Hunt, Oregon, 44 in 12 games (Records not kept previously in this department).

In team statistics, Washington leads in field goal shooting with 35.5 per cent. Oregon is tops at the free throw line: 65.9 per cent.

Reedsport, Roseburg Score Wins In 1st Round Of Sub-District Meet

Pre-tournament prognosticators beamed Wednesday night after the completion of the first round in the double-elimination Sub-district Basketball Tournament in the Roseburg High School gym.

Reedsport was expected to swamp Myrtle Creek and Roseburg was tabbed to do the same against Sutherlin. They did just

turned on their own brand of steam and caught the Braves at 6-all. From that point the score was tied seven more times and the lead changed eight times before the Braves started pulling away from a 20-20 tie. The Vikings scored rapidly on breaks into the key, but the Braves always managed to counter with deadly long shooting.

Height Begins To Tell

Finally, height began to tell the story. The league champions settled down to blanketing both boards and at the same time scoring with lethal accuracy. To make things more miserable for the scrappy Vikings, they hit their chronic third-quarter slump—and out the Braves coasted. Only Bob Wilder and Neil Tester hit from the field in the third quarter. Don Gillespie added a free throw to raise the Myrtle Creek total to five for that canto while Reedsport, paced by Berge Borrevik, was scoring 15.

The statistics are just as decisive as the score. Reedsport hit 28 of 64 from the field for a .438 average (.481 in the second half), and Myrtle Creek scored on 14 of 51 chances for a .274 average. The Braves captured 400 per cent of the rebounds to Myrtle Creek's .250.

Dick Kylo proved to be an uncanny long shot specialist. He couldn't miss from far out and he increased his stock by adding some tip-ins. His 24 points for the game, (18 in the first half) tied the three-year tournament record. Fred Kroush of Sutherlin canned 24 abasit Myrtle Creek last year.

The Roseburg-Sutherlin affair was yawning-provoking from the first three minutes. The Indians were hitting well from the field, but were definitely not clicking in the play-making department. This is probably the reason Coach Dick Ballantyne kept his first squad in through the first three quarters. As a result, the completely impotent Bulldogs fell heir to a routing which saw them trailing by 22 points at the half and 37 by the third quarter break. With the difference in scores at its greatest, 59-22, Ballantyne gave the last quarter to the subs. They didn't score from the field until 5:20 of that period, but the Bulldogs still couldn't narrow the scoring margin appreciably.

Bruce Dalros and Ralph Rudzik, at their scoring best paced the game with 15 points each. Dalros made the best showing of the

evening, at the free throw line by sinking seven of nine. His last six were consecutive. Nub Bessmer, a javney recruit, hit nine for the Bulldogs.

The game total of 49 fouls was a new record in sub-district tournament competition. Roseburg committed 27 and Sutherlin accounted for 22.

Lovellette Leads College Scorers

NEW YORK (AP)—Six times in the past nine years, an Eastern player has captured the national major college basketball scoring championship. But not this time.

If Clyde Lovellette, Kansas' perfectionist, doesn't make it, any one of four Southern players could come through. Among the Easterners, Larry Hennessey of Villanova barely makes the top ten, according to figures released Thursday by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau.

Lovellette, for the tenth time in 11 weeks, is ahead of the field, but not by much. His average is 26.2, followed closely by Bobby Pettit, Louisiana State's sophomore star, with 25.5—less than a point in the averages.

Then, in order, come Chuck Darling of Iowa with 25.2, Dick Groat of Duke with 25.1, Mark Workman of West Virginia with 24.8, and Frank Selvy of Furman with 24.5. After that list no one else has a chance.

In the field goal marksmanship department, Gerald Rogers of Texas Western took over the lead with a 51.4 mark. Bob Kenney of Kansas is No. 1 in free throws, Clarence Hannon of Army tops in rebounds and Groat best in assists.

Little River Sports Area Still In Formative Stage

A winter sports recreation area in the Little River vicinity was still at the talking stage Wednesday night after the second meeting of the newly formed ski club in the American Legion Hall.

Both Taft Mountain and Red Butte were sold under consideration, but the club decided to make no affirmative action on the site until on-the-spot study had been made by the appointed investigating committee. This six-person committee, made up of Bob Burgess, Bob Grant, George Churchill, Ray Betlock, Fred Welcher and Nancy Huelling, attempted to survey the two tentative sites last week, but snow hindered an extensive study.

Snow Removal Considered
In discussing the two proposed sites, George Churchill, Glide, forested for both will be that of snow removal on the access roads. He reported that the last strip of road into the Red Butte area was prospectively bad because of the steep grade. At Taft Mountain, he said, only a partial road is in evidence, but arrangements could be made to extend it.

A major portion of the ground-work was laid for the organization of the club on a more integrated basis with the presentation of a rough draft constitution. The points of the constitution were accepted, by the approximately 50 present, in principle. The name of the club was still under consideration. A final administrative act saw the appointment of Nancy Huelling to the office of secretary.

In order to drum up more interest in the activities the club has planned, the members will make arrangements for a mass excursion to Willamette Pass of skiers and those interested in learning to ski. This will be discussed more thoroughly at the next meeting, March 12.

It was reported by Fred Weber after the meeting that the Roseburg organization will join the Pacific Northwestern Ski Association.

CHICAGO (AP)—A high voltage field was set Thursday for the March 7 semi-finals and finals of the Golden Gloves tourney at the Chicago Stadium.

The array, 32 talented leather-slippers from 20 different cities who emerged from Wednesday night's quarter finals includes only one holdover champion.

He is Marine Kenny Davis, representing Los Angeles, the 126 pound titleholder, who polished off the 1950 champion at the same weight, Toledo's Ples Gilmore.

Los Angeles, leader in the team title competition with 16 points (a point for each bout won), produced three semi-finalists, as did three other cities—Gary, Ind., Detroit and St. Louis.

The heavyweight favorite continued to be 225 pound Ed Sanders of Los Angeles, whose chief threats appeared to be Herb Ellison of Detroit and George Beckolt of Great Lakes, Ill., Naval Training Center. Ellison halted Jak Solus of Kenosha, Wis., in one round, while Beckolt stopped Charles Bradley of Billings, Mont., in two.

Kentucky's Star Center Clears Name Of Fixing

NEW YORK (AP)—Big Bill Spivey, the University of Kentucky's All-America center, headed home Thursday convinced that he had cleared his name of the stigma of "fixing" basketball games.

Spivey's fate now is in the hands of the University Athletic Council, composed in part of faculty and in part of laymen.

Bill came here to clear his name," said Elmer Drake, one of his attorneys. And as far as I'm concerned he did. I can see no reason why the school will not permit him to play in the NCAA tournament."
