The Douglas Court No. 18, Order of Amaranth, will meet Friday evening at eight o'clock at the Masonic Temple. There will be an election of officers.

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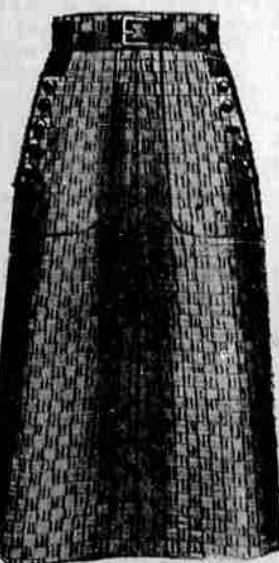
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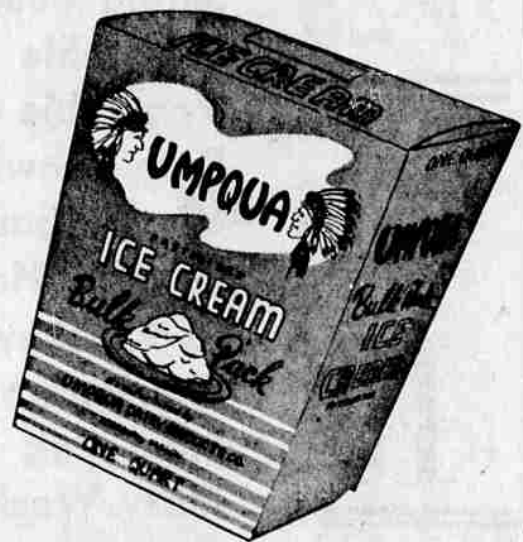
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
