

Baptist Church To Host Guild Girls Of Oregon

The First Baptist Church of Roseburg will host to the Guild Girls of Oregon today, Feb. 29, and March 1-2. Rev. Arthur Maye, director of Christian Education, Portland, will be the principal speaker.

Sarah Louise Walker, general missionary, and Florence Fair Hill, Christian Friendliness Missionary, both of Portland, will also take part on the three-day program.

Registration will begin at 5 p.m. today, followed by a supper and fellowship meeting with the state missionary as speaker. Saturday at 9:30 a.m., Mrs. Raymond Schaeffer will conduct the devotions, which will be followed by a business session and missionary conference divided into four groups. The groups will include: worship, music, work and Guild Girls Counsors' conference.

At 2 p.m., a program will be presented, which will include a skit by the missionary state officers, a play by the girls from Willamette and a missionary address. A banquet will be served at 6 p.m. Bernice Chase of Springfield will be mistress of ceremonies. Approximately 45

girls will come to Roseburg for the sessions.

Sunday morning at 9:45, a special meeting will be held, after which Mrs. Hammersley, state counselor, will be in charge of the Sunday School class for the group. During the morning church service, Mrs. Betty Stark Southwell, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. E. Beaver of Roseburg, will sing a solo and accompany herself on the auto-harp. Mrs. Southwell will be accompanied to Roseburg by her mother, Mrs. Byron Stark, formerly Pauline Beaver of this city, and now of Portland.

Churches Must Alter Courses, Sprague Advises

Churches must alter their courses if they are to administer to man's needs today, Ex-Governor Charles A. Sprague told Methodist leaders here Thursday night.

Sprague, speaking on "The Church in the Changing World," addressed a congregation following a banquet in the Methodist Church.

The speaker, presently editor of the Oregon Statesman, told the group the church, like other institutions, has to adapt to changing world conditions.

Man today is frustrated and in search of spiritual peace, Sprague said, and it is the duty of the church to provide him some measure of courage with which to meet life's threats.

But, the speaker explained, churches cannot administer to man's spiritual wants if they cling to old tenets and beliefs.

He emphasized this point by explaining that religion must be revised and interpreted to fill the psychological needs of man as they arise today.

The lack of this adaptation can mean trouble, Sprague said.

"If the church doesn't satisfy man's spiritual hungering, he will look for something else. Frequently this leads to mental disorders," he explained.

Remedy Offered

Turning to the relationship of churches and the world at large, Sprague saw a remedy in what he termed the "social gospel."

By this he meant the rehabilitation of persons in the lower economic strata by providing them with financial aid and guideposts of Christian principles.

As examples, Sprague cited the work being done in tenement slums, the work of missionaries and the aid being extended people in oppressed areas.

Such assistance, the speaker said, could in large part reduce the frustration plaguing people today by raising their economic standards.

There are also problems to be met on the local scene, Sprague explained.

Today, Roseburg presents a challenge, the editor said, and church groups should meet it with responsibility.

Increased population and industrial growth present problems that will have to be met, he noted. But, as on the larger scene, church groups can assist in their remedy only if they alter their routine.

Delinquency Laid By Dist. Atty. To Home Laxity

Solution of the juvenile delinquency problem is basically education with the parents, in the opinion of District Attorney Robert G. Davis, who spoke before the Lions Club Thursday night.

A visit to the homes of most delinquents will usually illustrate why those children are delinquents. He referred to broken homes, drunken fathers, or mothers who are forced to work to provide for their families and unable to care for their children as contributing factors toward delinquents.

As a case in point he discussed briefly the Vernon John Gosso case. Gosso, at 24, has been committed to the Oregon State Penitentiary for life, and is not eligible for parole. If he lives the normal life expectancy, he will be a ward of the state until he is 65 years of age.

Gosso, said Davis, has no real home. His father and mother were separated. His father had been in and out of the penitentiary from the time Vernon was a small child. At 11 or 12 years, he was stealing bicycles in wholesale lots and selling the parts. He was in and out of the Woodburn training school, and later in and out of prison, until he was a finished criminal product at the age of 24.

Practically every delinquency case can be laid at the doorstep of the parents, according to the district attorney. Youth centers and youth organizations usually provide an outlet only for those boys and girls who are going straight anyway. We can't expect schools in six hours to do what parents can't do the remainder of the day.

Remedial Action Begun

On the problem of what to do about it, Davis said that a committee on juvenile delinquency is being started in Roseburg, with its aim to make a correlated effort of all organizations interested in youth welfare.

He said County Judge Carl Hill has volunteered to be the chairman, that he will work on the committee, and that representatives from the churches, service clubs, medical society and a psychiatrist at the Veterans Hospital are desired on the committee.

Davis stated he did not wish to give the impression that we have a bunch of Al Capones in Douglas County, but that the problem is a serious one.
