Alaska Statehood Must Await Action On Hawaii

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate rejected Alaska statehood Wednesday but a battle immediately began on the issue of admitting Hawaii into the union.

By a one-vote margin, the Alaska bill was returned to committee with instructions that hearings be held and study given to the possibility of "commonwealth" status for both territories.

The vote was 45-44. It effectively ended any probability of further Senate consideration of the bill at this session.

The commonwealth proposal would give Alaska and Hawaii each the right to elect their own governors and local officials, participate in presidential elections, have full voting house representation and a non-voting Senator. It would require a constitutional amendment.

Red Cross Aids Hospital Vets' Rehabilitation

The American Red Cross is one of the many organizations that aids in the recovery of the hospitalized veteran at the Roseburg Veterans Administration Hospital. The council, with representatives from each of the participating counties - Polk, Linn, Lane, Douglas, Coos, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath and Benton - holds meetings every two months.

These chapters generously provide extra items that cannot be purchased with government funds. The Junior Red Cross provides menu covers for various holidays, decorations for semi-monthly patient dances, and for special holidays such as decorations for the tree at Christmas. Each chapter takes its turn in sponsoring the monthly birthday party, furnishing entertainment, birthday gifts, and refreshments. The Red Cross also sponsors its share of patient dances.

All Chapters provide "luxury" items for indigent patients unable to purchase them. A few of these items are: Stamps, canteen books, slippers, jackets, and homemaker's cookies and candy which are thoroughly enjoyed by every patient.

Douglas County provides Gray Ladies to work in the hospital and a few of the activities in which they participate are: Take the library book cart on the ward to non-ambulant patients; shelf books; help distribute current magazines; help patients select books. The rhythm band is very dependent on the Gray Lady conductors and pianist; the current events book review class, conducted by Gray Ladies, is a very popular activity. The chaplain's Bible class is conducted by a Gray Lady, who also provides volunteer singers and pianists. There are many patients who are unable to write their own letters and cards a Gray Lady does this for them. Gray Ladies assist in other recreational activities, such as at card parties, picnics in the grove, patient shows, acting as hostesses, and assisting otherwise where needed. The Gray Ladies sponsor and participate in shuffleboard tournaments in which the spirit of competition runs very high. Gray Ladies are assigned to Occupational Therapy to help work with patients in ceramics, weaving, painting, etc.

Soviet Newspaper Raps Billy Graham

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Army newspaper Red Star Wednesday called American Evangelist Billy Graham a "charlatan," or quack. It headlined its story on Graham's Washington revival meetings: "Americans in hysterics."

The newspaper said the meetings were attended "not only by simpletons inexperienced in politics but also by correspondents avid for sensations."

It denounced the evangelist for supporting American "war" policies, and added: "American senators and members of the House of Representatives come with humble looks and with bluffed smiles. They listen to the howlings of a preacher who goes into hysterics."
