

Drain, Elkton Trounce Opponents To Gain Berth In 'B' Loop Finals

Elks Dump Eagles, 48-42; Warriors Nip Oaks, 36-29

Bominations are now closed for district 4-B playoff berths from Douglas County.

Drain and Elkton moved into the finals of the Douglas County "B" League Basketball Tournament at Yoncalla Thursday night and at the same time gained the two county spots in the four-team district 4 tournament. The two teams play for the county championship in the county finals Saturday night.

Not one game was a walkaway in the second round of the Douglas County tournament race last night in the championship bracket, Elkton was pushed to the limit in keeping its favorite rating by dumping host Yoncalla, 48-42. The other title game saw a staunch Oakland squad fall to a taller Drain quintet, 36-29. In the consolation play, Glendale stopped a surprising Yoncalla squad, 39-31, and Riddle fought to a 24-19 decision over Canyonville. Both Drains and Canyonville were eliminated from the tourney with their second losses.

Missed Badly Although the favored Elkton Elks were missing badly for the second straight night, they proved their clutch playing ability from the free throw line to win their 6th game in 17. Two dozen Yoncalla fouls helped the Elks cause immeasurably. The North Hall champions hit 13 of 23.

In the first quarter, it was a matter of free throw necessity. From the field, the Elks were completely off. In the first seconds of the game, they had five open chances for shots, but missed every one. Meanwhile, in the first two minutes, Eagles Bob Means and Don Vest scored three baskets to put their quintet ahead, 6-1. But in five minutes, the Eagles had already committed 11 fouls. John Beckley hit his team's sixth foul shot at 6:15 minutes and pushed his team ahead for goods with another second later.

By the first break, the Elks were on top, 10-6, and they continued to hold their own until the fading minutes.

Vest and Bill Fast went to work rapidly in the third quarter to cut the score down to 29-28, but that's as close as the Eagles got to posting the major upset of the tourney. Their rugged pressing length-of-the-floor defense had the Elks on the ropes through most of the game, but the winners always managed to stave off Oakland's managed to get in the last punch.

Vest and Fast led the scorers with 16 and 14 points, respectively. Drain grabbed the lead immediately and managed to stave off Oakland's staunch hoopers the rest of the game. Beside domination of the backboards, the Warriors can attribute much of their success to the method of stopping

high-scoring Lyle Beecroft. The red-haired ace was thoroughly bottled up with a collapsing defense which ruined his pivots and jumps under the basket.

Score Sliced

Oakland's slow, deliberate play kept this squad between four and seven points off the pace, and at one time in the fourth quarter, Beecroft hit two free throws to slice the score to 29-27. But Drain had the boards virtually blanketed and Jack Weaver came through with baskets when they were most needed to frustrate the Oaks. Weaver collected 14 to lead the game's scorers.

In the top consolation game, Canyonville hit a scoreless second period to lose by just five points. The Irish had a decisive 22-11 lead at the third quarter break, but a spirited Tiger drive in the last quarter cut that lead more than half. Utter futility marked the efforts of both teams from the foul line. Canyonville hit 7 of 25 and Riddle had 4 of 17.

Days Creek found its way in the third quarter in its loss to Glendale. After trailing badly in the first half, the Wolves came back to push the surprised Pirates, 24-19, by the third breather. Glenn Austin kept his Glendale team in the tourney by slamming in 14 points.

Williams, Kiner Haven't Signed 1952 Contracts

NEW YORK (AP) — Ted Williams and Ralph Kiner head a small but impressive list of Major League baseball stars who have not signed their 1952 contracts.

An Associated Press survey Friday revealed that 29 players—17 in the American League and 12 in the National—have not come to terms.

The majority will be classified as "holdouts" if they fail to sign by Saturday, the official start of spring training.

Five National League clubs, the champion New York Giants, the St. Louis Cardinals, Cincinnati Reds, Chicago Cubs and Brooklyn Dodgers, have all of their players in the fold. Only the Chicago White Sox in the American can make the Saturday deadline.

Williams, one of four Red Sox dickering for terms, is scheduled to appear at the Sox' Sarasota base Saturday for a conference with General Manager Joe Cronin.

The high-salaried slugger is due to report to the Marines May 2 and is seeking a special contract to cover the period until he returns to service.

Infielders Billy Goodman, Johnny Pesky and Pitcher Mel Parnell are the other recalcitrant Red Sox.

Goodman is asking \$25,000, Pesky \$22,500 and Parnell \$30,000.

Kiner reportedly is aiming for a two-year contract at \$70,000 per season, an increase of \$5,000 over his \$65,000 salary.
